The submarine warfare by Germany against commerce with the British Isles, has now been waged for nearly twenty-one weeks, and Admiral Oscar von Truppet, who was at one time German Governor of Kia Chou, in China, which was wrested from Germany by British and Japan-ese forces, raises the question in 'Der Tag' yesterday whether the value of this submarine warfare against British commerce is enough to justify its continuance in its present form at the expense of a rupture with the United States. He puts the question: "Can we hope, so far as we are able to foresee, to force England to its knees through submarine warfare against her commerce?" The very
