A GERMAN DENIAL.

BERLIN, Dec. 8.

Semi-official parliamentary news agency, yesterday, issued a statement denying rumors abroad that the committee investigating the war guilt of German leaders in 1914 had discovered its meeting. On the contrary, the statement says, it is intended to conduct the investigation with energy and speed, but new methods will be adopted, which will make it impossible for witnesses to misuse the committee's spirit shown them for party purposes. The investigating committee intends to conclude its investigation in the manner in which President Wilson's peace tentatives were accepted, as soon as possible, so that the possibilities of the spring and early summer of 1917 can be subjected to scrutiny.

SNOBBERY MUST GO.

LONDON, Dec. 8.

The London Correspondent of the Liverpool Post says newspaper representatives on the tour of Prince of Wales complain of a want of consideration, not on the part of the Prince, who was charming, but certain members of his staff, and pointedly stated that if a tour of India or Australia is to be undertaken, a better understanding will have to be established.

ITALY'S ONLY AIM.

ROME, Dec. 7.

The reply of the Italian Senate to the speech from the Throne, delivered at the opening of Parliament by King Victor Emmanuel, declared Italy has no imperialistic aims. The Senate answered to the King, which was written by Senator Horris, of Trieste, says with decided firmness, we want all Italy's children freed, and the legitimate reclamation of the land usurped by foreign greed. We are not inspired by a desire for domination, nor for gain, but by a generous feeling, which would be useful for that peace, which humanity desires. Our victory, annihilating a powerful adversary, hastened the peace which should be imposed on us and our brethren, so that their cry of sorrow shall no longer afflict Italy and Europe.

CARPENTIER WAITING.

PARIS, Dec. 8.

Georges Carpentier said this evening, regarding the rumors of contracts for fights with Dempsey, "I have signed nothing; I am waiting for offers. I want a little time to think it over." Seldom has a conquering hero returned from a victorious campaign with such a welcome as Carpentier got.

BROUGHT IN SURVIVORS.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 9.

The liner Mississippi arrived in port today from Havre. She had on board fifteen survivors of the French liner Colmar, which sank off the Nova Scotian coast on Saturday between Canso and Sable Island.

UNANIMOUSLY AGAINST.

BERLIN, Dec. 9.

The only voice in Germany, advocating immediately yielding to the Entente demands, that the protocol in

connection with the Peace Treaty be signed, is an Independent Socialist newspaper, according to the diplomatic correspondent of the Nord Deutsche Zeitung. Apart from this newspaper, says the correspondent, there is, thank God, unanimity from right to left, contrasting with the sharp division of opinion occasioned by the signing of the Peace Treaty.

D'ANNUNZIO HAS NO WAR CHEST.

ROME, Dec. 8.

The Popolo Romano today says that Gabriele D'Annunzio has assured the Italian Government that he will not undertake any new expeditions, or go beyond the Armistice line. It is rumored that D'Annunzio's funds are exhausted, and that he is in an embarrassed situation. There is much speculation in Rome as to how he will manage to pay his troops, unless an agreement is reached with the Italian Govt.

DEVOUTLY TO BE WISHED.

LONDON, Dec. 9.

Andrew Bonar Law, Government spokesman, declared in the House of Commons today that there was little reason to doubt that communications proceeding between the Allied and associated powers and Germany, with reference to immediate ratification of the Peace Treaty would have a satisfactory issue.

GREEKS HAVE REACHED LIMIT.

SALONIKI, Dec. 7.

Greek troops in Asia Minor have advanced to the line fixed by the Peace Conference, according to an official statement issued at Army Headquarters here. The zone of occupation fixed for the Greeks has thus been completely occupied.

BIG FIVE TO BIG FOUR.

PARIS, Dec. 8.

The Supreme Council today took up the unfinished business of the Peace Conference in an effort to dispose of the most urgent questions. It purposes also to decide upon the reference of the other pending questions to the proper quarters for decision, after the big five becomes the big four, as it is expected the Supreme Council, with the four principal Allied Powers represented, will continue to meet after the American delegates leave tomorrow. As far as the Americans are concerned, the Supreme Council will cease to exist after the signing of the Hungarian Peace Treaty. It is as yet not decided who will sign that document for the United States, although in all probability it will be Ambassador Wallace.

PARIS SHOULDERS CARPENTIER.

PARIS, Dec. 7.

George Carpentier, who defeated Joe Beckett of London, on Thursday last for the boxing championship of Europe, arrived at the Gare Du Nord to-night and received an enthusiastic welcome from 10,000 persons, who had gathered to greet him. Carpentier was hoisted to the shoulders of the crowd and carried along in a triumphant procession.

PLACING THE RESPONSIBILITY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.

Failure of the United States Senate to ratify the Peace Treaty is directly responsible for the refusal of the German delegates to sign the Peace Protocol, according to Ernest Maxheim, Professor of Political Economy and

International Law at the University of Liège. Professor Maxheim was one of the Belgian Government's delegates to the International Labor Congress.

CARRANZA IMPLICATED.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.

Evidence that Radicals in Mexico, with the knowledge and support of President Carranza, plotted to instigate a revolution in the United States, and to seize the border States acquired by the American Government in 1848, is contained in the memorandum presented to President Wilson by Senator Hall, Chairman of the Foreign Relations Sub-Committee, investigating the Mexican situation.

"ATLANTIC" LAID UP.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Dec. 9.

The Handley-Page airplane, which made a forced landing here several weeks ago, while on a non-stop flight from New York to Chicago, will be stored here for the winter, and workmen today completed the dismantling of the machine. Repairs to the wings, which were damaged when the plane crashed, was postponed until the spring, because of the delay in the shipment of parts from England. The crew, headed by Vice-Admiral Kerr, former commander of the British naval squadron in the Adriatic, has gone to New York.

BOLSHEVIKS THIRTEEN POINTS.

DORPAT, Dec. 9.

The Bolshevik delegation, which is here to discuss the possibilities of peace with representatives of the Baltic States, today published their thirteen points for peace; their conditions declare that the Treaty must be based on the principle of self determination and without any indemnities. The terms prepared are, first, mutual recognition of independence; second, suspension of state of war; third, suspension of hostilities and determination of the time for withdrawal of the troops; fourth, declaration of the Estonian Govt. of the non existence of an alliance of the states warring with the Soviet; fifth, similar declarations with reference to other forces opposed to the Soviet Government; sixth, the interment and disarmament of General Yudenitch, Commander of the Russian Northwest army, and the empowering of his war stores under seal; seventh, amnesty for alliances condemned for support of the Soviet Government, or taking part of the third international; eighth, provisions for a commercial treaty; ninth, resumption of diplomatic relations; tenth, resumption of postal and telegraphic relations; eleventh, joining up of railways; twelfth, transit over the Estonian railways for goods from Estonian ports bound for Russia, and thirteenth, the establishment of dockage facilities for Soviet Russian bound goods.
