Poultry Association Meeting.

On Monday night the Newfoundland Poultry Association held their annual meeting in the Board of Trade Rooms. Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, C.M.G., presided. The Secretary's report on the recent show, the treasurer's statement of finance and letters from Judge Jackson and Prof. Landey, were read and received with great enthusiasm. Prof. Landey sent in reports of an egg laying competition being held at Truro, N.S., at the Agricultural College there. Thirty pens of five birds each are entered, Barrd Rocks, White and Buff Leghorns, R. S. and single comb R. I. Reds and Wyandottes, comprise the entries. The contest started No. 1, and so far the birds laying the largest number of eggs is a pen of 5 Ross Comb Rhode Island Red hens, owned by Mr. John Retson, Truro, laying 170 eggs to date, weighing 304 ounces; second pen is a pen of Barrd Plymouth Rocks, owned by John R. McMullen, Truro, with 133 eggs, weighing 265 ounces; White Leghorns are third with 120 eggs, weighing 229 ounces, owned by R. H. Evans, of Trenton. We notice Judge Henry, and old visitor to Newfoundland Poultry shows, of Shubenacadie, has a pen of Rhode Island Reds in the competition. One pen only from Antigonish has not laid a single egg to date.

Prof. Landey has sent a photograph of the pens to Vice-President G. R. Williams. The presidents report for the year was read after which the election of officers took place, which resulted as follows:—
