David, the Royal Psalmist.

The name David, meaning beloved, is a favorite one with the Welsh as with Hebrews, and for this reason many historians claim that Welshmen are descended from the lost tribes of Israel.

David, King of Palestine and founder of the Judaeen dynasty at Jerusalem, was born about 1055 B.C., and died in the year 1115 B.C.

The eighth son of Jesse, a wealthy farmer, he began life by overseeing the care of his father's sheep in the rich pastures about Bethlehem. It was during these lonely vigils that he developed the strength, agility, endurance and courage which distinguished him throughout life. There too, he acquired that skill in music which led to his introduction to Saul.

His musical ability brought him into favor with that King, and led to an appointment as his armor bearer.

Possessed of a romantic and picturesque personality, it was no wonder that he made rapid progress at court. As a reward for slaying the giant Goliath, with a well-slung stone, he was given one of the King's daughters in marriage and thus became the King's son-in-law.

But as David's popularity with the people grew, Saul became more and more jealous of him, and finally, fearing that his armor bearer, aimed at his throne, in a frenzy of rage, tried to murder the young warrior, and at another time formed a plot to assassinate him. Jonathan, Saul's son, and David's great friend, mended the breach for a time, but finally to be rid of David the king gave him a military command.

A great poet and a great musician David now proved himself a successful soldier. But this proved too much for Saul who drove his son-in-law into exile.

The outlawed David soon gathered a band of outlaws around him who looked up to him as a petty chief, and helped him to maintain a useful guerrilla warfare against the Philistines, his country's enemies on the Mediterranean coast line.

Upon Saul's death in battle, David already anointed King by Samuel the prophet, was recognized as such by the greater part of the Hebrew people, and made the fairly strong position of Hebron his capital.

His first duty as King was to deal with the great national enemy, the Philistines; so falling upon them in the valley of Rephaim, David in two fierce battles completely broke their power.

The next step was to attack Jerusalem, the most strategically suitable place in the country for a capital, held by the Jebusites. An exploit similar to that by which Wolfe conquered Canada gave the Rock fortress into the hands of David's "mighty men."

Having provided his kingdom with a strong capital and overcome the Philistines, David took away other portions of the "promised land" from the Moabites. Successful campaigns against the Ammonites, the Edomites and against rebellions, brought David's military career as general to a close.

As well as the stories of his prowess in battle, there are many beautiful stories about David's kindness and sweet humility. The choicest of which is perhaps the water story which follows:

While reconnoitering near his native town one hot summer day David was about overcome with thirst and three of his officers, without his knowledge, forced a passage through the enemy lines and brought him water. But instead of drinking it, the thirsty King poured it out upon the ground "before Jehovah," as though he was saying, "This is not water. This is the lifeblood of three of my bravest. This is the chalice of that love that can look with a smile into the face of death. I am not worthy to drink of this cup. I have been selfish and have no right to touch this offering—this sacrament of unselfishness and fidelity. I can but offer it to God."

One of David's lasting memorials was the first edition of a hymnal for religious services. Subsequent additions have enlarged and changed it, but the amended edition at present in use, and incorporated in the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures still bears this name, "The Psalms of David."

Starves in Order to Convert Husband.

Still refusing to take food because her husband "has no religion," Mrs. Ernest S. Harrington, of Danville, Ill., on Jan. 8th entered the 38th day of her fast. She allowed a physician to examine her, but refused his efforts to administer medicine. She insisted God had told her to fast and pray, and repeated she was determined to force her husband into the church.

"I will continue fasting and praying until God grants my prayer," she said. "While my husband is not a bad man, he has no religion, and He said this would be the means of converting him." "I do not believe in her kind of religion, and besides, I am not ready to join the church," said her husband. "If she wants to starve herself to death that's her business."
