als of leading brands and further it
does not effect the question of agency.
It was to their common interest to
get the best possible price for the fish
and Mr. Barr's brand was used, and
he is paid for it at a value per drum.
This is the strongest argument in fa-
vour of Mr. Barr's agency, as he was
not paid the ordinary brokerage. Re-
ferring to the matter of claims, Mr.
Winter said that here, too, Mr. Barr's
actions were quite open. Immediately
Mr. Coaker returns from abroad Mr.
Barr consulted with him about the
claims. If he had finished with the
cargo, all he need have said was:
"well, Mr. Barr, that's your business."
It is quite true that Mr. Coaker has
not committed himself in writing, but
under such circumstances why did he
not go to Mr. Monroe, Mendez Lima's
agent here, and inform him of his
position and tell him that he was no
concern of his. As to Mr. Barr, his
correspondence with Mr. Monroe and
his telegrams, etc., are all plain to be
seen, they are in cold print. In these
letters Mr. Barr says that Mr. Coaker
admitted liability to the extent of 50
shillings per quintal and was willing
to pay it out of returns from the No-
velty's cargo which was then also
being negotiated for by Mr. Barr
under similar terms as the Free-
dom's. Mr. Coaker certainly did not
repudiate the claims. The Novelty
was to be treated on the same basis,
yet when this sale did not mat-
terialize, Mr. Coaker took the fish and
sold it, he says, at a ruinous price in
Italy. He took it and dealt with it
without asking Mr. Barr's permission.
Mr. Winter also submitted that ac-
cording to Mr. Coaker's evidence he
had not looked for the 10 shillings
per drum that is still owed by Mr.
Barr. Why is this? It is hard to imag-
ine that the F.P.C. Trading Company
is in such a flourishing condition in
these hard times that it can afford to
forgo such a large sum of money.
The general language of Mr. Coaker
when he said he sold in order to in-
troduce the Trading Company's fish to
Brazil raises the question of why does
he sell it to another man. Mr. Winter
submitted that the real fact was that
Mr. Coaker had a lot of fish. He was
on good terms with Mr. Barr, who was
a friend of Mr. Monroe, the Brazil
firm's agent here, and Barr was em-
ployed by Coaker to sell the fish and
get a footing for him in Brazil. The
absence of the invoice, no demand for
payment of balance, etc., Mr. Coaker's
silence, all go to prove that it was
plainly a matter of Barr being the
agent. Therefore the plaintiff must
look for the money from the party
who has it, and in this case it is the
F.P.C. Trading Company. Mr. Winter
spoke at some length on the matter of
the claims, and the law in such cases.
The firm had forwarded their claim
on the 14th of March and the vessel
had arrived between the 5th and 8th.
The first claim had been for 14¢ but
when the fish had all been examined
the claim was increased to 30¢. The
fish was sold to be delivered at Brazil
in good condition and the risk was
the seller's. The fish, however, did not
turn out as it was contracted for the
seller is responsible for the claims if
any. In connection with the Govern-
ment Fishery Regulations at that
time, one of the outstanding rules was
that there must be Government In-
spection of fish. The law was brought
into force by the Minister of Marine
& Fisheries, yet there is not one atom
of evidence submitted to show that he
obeyed this law of his own making.
Not a cutter had been called who
handled the fish. The Regulations
called for certificates. Some cer-
tificates must have been given, but it was not
produced. Two certificates should
have been furnished, one by the Govern-
ment Inspector. The Inspector had
been a little too strict, and the fish
was being inspected too well. He was
quietly removed from the scene of his
activities. The wharfinger said he
saw half of the cargo. There was
some bad fish but he rejected to con-
siderable quantity of it. How can it
be known that some of this fish did
not eventually find its way back again?
It appears quite plain that it was never
inspected at this end and it has been
abundantly proven by Mendez
Lima that it was bad when it reached
them. The defendants have not pro-
duced evidence to rebut it and it is
quite apparent that Mr. Snodgrass's
story of the sunburn and damp fish
is 50 p.c. correct. Mr. Winter said it
was strong language to use, but if the
Regulations were carried out all over
the country as they were with the
Freedom's cargo, then there is every
reason why they were not a success,
and why this country suffered from
them. In conclusion Mr. Winter said
that they had clearly proven their

case and he asked for damages for his
clients.
At the conclusion of Counsel's argu-
ment, the court announced that its
judgment would be handed down later.

other writers not drawn the attention

would have passed almost unnoticed.

names of the Child Welfare Associa-
tion you will find, I think, that the
members of the S. P. C. A. are among
the most indefatigable workers and
organizers of Child Welfare, and
where one dollar is raised for the
protection of animals, a thousand is
raised for Child Welfare by these
very same people.
Hoping you will kindly publish this
letter.
