

The Claim of the Widow

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—In your issue of the 22nd inst. it was pleasing to see that the British House of Commons had unanimously agreed to a motion for the establishment of pensions for all widows with children or others whose breadwinners are incapable. It is true that a move in the same direction should be made on behalf of the destitute of our little country, for there are many poor mothers who have been deprived of their breadwinners ability to procure the necessities of life who have had to struggle against crushing odds to keep the wolf from the door, and whose pride has often concealed the real conditions existing within the privacy of her home.

I have in mind instances such as the above of mothers who have had to face the future after seeing their helpmates taken from them by a lingering illness or otherwise, and who have absolutely nothing to console them apart from the knowledge that they would be added to the pauper's list and receive the miserable pittance of about \$2.50 per month to help support from one to six or more bodies. The dependents of those who are lost at sea, or of those who paid the Supreme price in the recent struggle for Democracy have something to console them from a financial standpoint, but for those who are deprived of their loved one through ordinary physical disability there is no provision made by the State but the humiliating pauper's dole.

The argument may be raised that there are Orphanages, but what mother who has a real mother's heart would not rather deprive herself of what is required to sustain life so that she could keep her little brood around her, and instead of leaving them with strangers have the comfort of attending to their various needs. I have nothing but kind thoughts for those who are the guardians of the fatherless and motherless who come under their care, but there are many through varying circumstances who are not so fortunate and who should be cared for by the State in which they exist.

As this present juncture should be an opportune time to consider such matters as the above, and I hope that others may get interested and let the public have their views so that provision may be made for the adequate maintenance of many who are neglected, and who in later years may become a liability instead of the asset that they would be if properly treated now.
