City Council to-night.

Mr. E. B. Smith and wife (nee Miss Daisy Brown, Hamilton), left on the 4:20 train yesterday afternoon on a short visit to friends in Toronto.

Mr. George T. Bell, son of Inspector Bell, chief clerk for General Superintendent Edgar, of the G. T. C., was in the city yesterday on route to Chicago to Montreal.

A Tara correspondent writes: Mr. P. Munroe left for London the other day. He purposes placing himself under the care of an expert, with a view to getting relief from catarrh.

Miss Al. Trainor, of Chicago, who has been visiting the Misses Rutson for some weeks past, has left for London, where she will make a stay before proceeding home.

Mr. W. Watmough, farmer, South Dorchester, made an assignment on Saturday to Mr. J. P. Findlay, St. Thomas, for the benefit of his creditors. The liabilities are about \$1,500, and the estate it is thought will pay about 75 cents on the dollar.

A very serious accident which may prove fatal occurred at the Union Furniture Factory, Wingham, the other day. A man named Terrill was working at a saw, when a piece of wood that he was cutting broke off and struck him with terrific force in the lower part of the body, entering several inches.

Mr. William Thornton's (of North Oxford) claim against the London Mutual has been settled by the payment of \$200. This was for barn and contents and a span of horses, burned last harvest, and covers a very small percentage of the loss sustained, but as the policy had expired and a legal claim could not be set up, the company voted the above amount in a spirit of creditable liberality to Mr. Thornton, who is an old member.

Accident at Ingersoll.
Word was received in the city of an accident of a serious character at Ingersoll on Saturday night. The Grand Trunk train leaving here about 7 o'clock, known as the "hog express," being a local mixed, arrived at that place about 8 o'clock. An elderly man named McRae, an employee of the company, got on the track in some unexplained manner and was struck by the engine. His legs were both badly crushed below the knees. One foot was cut off entirely and the other was so badly mangled that the doctors decided that it would have to be amputated. Being somewhat advanced in years McRae's recovery is very doubtful.

Who Will Get the Silver Service?
Application for probate of the will and one codicil of Wilson Peirce, late of Hamilton, and once a resident of London, commercial traveler, who died on Oct. 14, 1889, has been filed. Rev. H. D. Hunter's Last Sermon.
The Rev. H. D. Hunter preached his final sermon prior to departing for Illinois at the First Congregational Church last night to a large and interested audience. Preceding the sermon, Deacon Mathewson announced a farewell gathering which would be held in the school room, and extended a cordial invitation to all. Mr. Hunter added that on account of recent illness he had been unable to do the amount of visiting he intended, and he was exceedingly happy that an opportunity would be given him to meet with them. He had been puzzled as to how he would depart himself on this occasion, whether to review the work of the past nine years or give the people some word of counsel for the future. Being, however, wholly unable to overcome the strong feeling which took possession of his heart on seeing so many present, he had determined to divide between the two, and leave the words of farewell until the night of the social gathering. The text was taken from Matthew, ix, 21: "If I may but touch his garment I shall be whole," and was used typically to show how indispensably necessary it is to the Christian life, that the following he lay touch with Christ. He concluded by saying in a voice overcome by emotion, "I may never preach a sermon to you again, but I hope, I trust, with all my heart I pray, that every man and woman, every boy and girl, every child within this church to-night, may come into personal contact with Jesus Christ our Saviour and Lord."

St. Peter's Cathedral.
Rev. Father Donnan, a well-known Jesuit, preached last night in St. Peter's Cathedral, which was completely filled. The reverend father chose as his subject, "Charity—A Flower of Christian Growth." He dealt with it in a masterly manner. He dealt with the socialistic question, and declared that it was not a matter for surprise that the working classes were almost in a state of rebellion against God and against those who were blessed with more material prosperity than they. Their life was one of constant toil without reward and if they saw no evidence of a divine dispensation in their life and nothing but poverty to look for in the future, they were scarcely to be blamed for believing that the socialistic doctrines so rampant at the present day and to scorn the idea of the existence of a God centered in their personal welfare. Equalization of property has been suggested as a remedy for this evil, but the only true solution of the problem was in the spread of Christian charity. Charity was indeed a flower of Christian growth, for charity could only exist in Christianity. This was evinced by the numerous benevolent institutions with which all Christian lands abound, while in those countries where paganism ruled supreme no such havens for suffering humanity were to be found. True, individual greatness was not hereditary and could not be attained unless charity was made a part of the Christian's mission to Africa was undertaken for the good of humanity, and that man was now more honored in the civilized world than all the crowns of Europe. The speaker concluded his eloquent address by exhorting his hearers to be charitable in all their dealings with one another, and let no social barrier remain in the way of their intercourse. The congregation contributed liberally to the collection, which was in aid of the poor.

A MOVE FOR A SEWER.
The City Engineer Will Prepare an Estimate for the Carling Creek Sewer.

A special meeting of No. 2 Committee was held Saturday evening for the purpose of considering the proposition for the construction of a sewer in the bed of the Carling Creek. Present: Chairman Jones, Alds. Draney, Garratt, W. J. O'Meara, Mayor Taylor and Engineer Tracy. Communications from Mr. T. A. McKinnon, general superintendent of the C. P. R. and Hon. Mr. Fraser, Minister of Public Works (which appeared in the ADVERTISER in a previous issue) with reference to the subject were then read.

Ald. Garratt asked that the City Engineer prepare plans as to the probable cost of the construction of the sewer. He suggested the building of a trunk sewer which would stand for all time and would take storm water as well as the sewage from the Military School and the Asylum. The system of deceleration was a matter that was left with the Provincial Board of Health.

Engineer Tracy proposed that estimates be obtained of both brick and tile sewers. He thought that the former would cost about \$10 a foot and the latter would probably cost the same amount.

Ald. Garratt introduced the following resolution:

That the City Engineer be requested to prepare a plan and an estimate of the cost of a brick sewer down the course of the Carling Creek large enough to carry off all the storm water and sewage matter, also as to the cost of a tile sewer down the course of the same creek.

Mayor Taylor and the Engineer were delegated to go down to Toronto to press the matter with the Government.

AMALGAMATION.
The Committee Are Agreed as to the Rate of Assessment is "Ward Six" Changed.

The joint committee on amalgamation of London South and the city met in the City Hall on Saturday evening. Present: Chairman Turner, Alds. Jones, Garratt, Anderson and O'Meara, Messrs. Thomas, Alexander, E. J. Blackwell, George Sutherland, William Rowe, E. Parnell, J. Dewar, Mayor Taylor, Engineer Tracy and Secretary Kingston. The reading of the draft of the bill to be submitted was then proceeded with. In clause 1 the date of amalgamation was fixed for May 1.

In order to cover the objection made by some of the township people Mr. Cameron moved:

That this committee do not object to the southern boundary of the proposed new ward, No. 6, being altered on the Private Bills Committee making the limit between lots Nos. 2 and 3, east of the Worley road, the boundary between the Hamilton road and the Worley road instead of the Chester street as at present contemplated, and also accepting the western boundary proposed by the Township Council of Westminster, naming the limit between lots 28 and 31, broken front concession, in case the boundary is satisfactory to the said Council.

The motion was carried unanimously. Some discussion then arose as to what the rate of assessment would be in the event of amalgamation. It was moved by Mr. Alexander, seconded by Mr. Cameron and carried.

That the city shall immediately after amalgamation assess the said ward as provided by paragraph 4 of the bill, but the city shall only collect upon said assessment two-thirds of the taxes for one year, together with a special rate and a rate on the basis of the ward's expenditure for the one-third of the said year 1891 in the said proposed Ward No. 6.

The bill was then adopted without further changes.

An Interesting Report.
The Inland Revenue and Department has been issued a bulletin of about 30 pages, which is devoted exclusively to the subject of baking powder, and which shows that the majority of the bakeries in the country are adulterated and unfit for use. Prof. A. McGill, who has had charge of this important work for the Government, says that "imperial baking powder is an excellent powder. A word to the sensible housekeeper should be sufficient."
