Light weight and ordinary and common quality car stuff and mixed butchers' grades of cattle soid readily at strong 25c advance on last week's price. Bulls stags, or coarse shagey steers brought 15c advance. There was a good demand for stock cattle for feeders, and when tittle more than half-fat the butchers boad humbers that comprised about one-half of the 15 to 18 cars on sale were the advance. Some of the poor grade stuff sold at low as \$16 to \$18 por head, but choice milkors and springers sold at full last week's prices, to \$1 to \$2 a head better, some choice cows selling at \$40 to \$45 and \$46 per head.

C. J. Weir, the night yardmaster of the the M. C. R., St. Thomas, who shot himself yesterday, leaves a wife and one child. The reason of his rash act is not known. Weir was a comparatively young man, of considerable railway experience, and was generally well liked on the road. The St. Thomas Times says: "Later inquiries seem to indicate the fact that there was a woman in connection with the trouble which led to the suicide of Trainmaster Weir yesterday morning. It is said that he was found early in the morning in the room of Maud Glover, a girl employed at the M. C. R. dining-rooms, formerly of Port Stanley. A conversation which the girl had with a gentleman who saw her since, left the impression that Weir had agreed to elope with her that morning. At all events the girl was terribly shocked when she heard of his tragic death, and has since twice endeavored to obtain poison with a view, it is supposed, of committing suicide. On the other hand, Mrs. Weir claims to have had no suspicion of any unfaithful conduct on the part of her husband, and in giving an account of the matter this would gladly have been passed over, but our duty as public journalists is to throw all the light possible upon such a sad affair. It is said that a letter addressed to his father was left, and this may some further clear up the mystery. All the drug stores in the city were warned by the police not to sell Miss Glover poison." The deceased was the only child of James Weir a retired farmer of Manchester, Mich., and was in the 36th year of his age. He leaves a wife and one child, a lad about 7 or 8 years of age. He was appointed assistant trainmaster on June 26, 1887, and had since filled that position. He was a member of the Board of Directors of the Railroad Hospital Association, a member of Antiquity Lodge, A. O. U. W., of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, and of Rathbone Lodge, Knights of Pythias.

MR. PAUL PEEL,

tch About Canadian Artists Which fers to Him in Complimentary Terms.

"In the opinion of many of the most competent critics the work of Paul Peel, one of the younger generation of Canadian artists, places him head and shoulders above his contemporaries. Peel is a Canadian by birth. He lived during the most important period of his life in Paris, and his work is in most respects as French as his masters. He is principally a figure painter, although he often paints land-scapes with figures; and he has accomplished that which no Canadian artist residing in Canada has dared toattempt—absolute command over the plastic lines and tints of the undraped figure. At 30 years of age he is pre-eminently the best artist Canada has yet produced, and what he has done is only a promise of still greater things. He has been an artist since early boyhood, having begun his studies while still attending the public school in his native town of London, Ontario. At 17 he entered the Philadelphia Academy of Fine Arts, and the Royal Academy, shortly afterwards removing to Paris, where he remained for ten years studying under Gerome, Boulanger, Lefevere, Doucet and Benjamin Constant, being nearly four years under the tutelage of the latter. A short time ago, family affairs brought him to Canada, and he made his visit the occasion of an exhibition of some of his paintings. The collection was probably the finest by one artist ever seen in Canada. It was certainly the best exhibition made by a Canadian artist in his own country. Among the canvases was a magnificent nude, but it had all the delicacy and poetry with which such men as Sir Frederick Leighton and Soloman J. Soloman invest the undraped figure. The picture was exhibited with others in the Paris Salon in 1889, and excited considerable enthusiasm. It was a distinct success, and the success was recorded in London and New York at the time. In the recent exhibition there were also some delightful pictures of French peasant life, in which Peel is particularly happy—painted in Brittany, Normandy and Paris; and in addition to these were several Canadian subje
