## An Inspection Mysterious.

Some of the Circumstances Attending

Robert Hewson's Death.

The Funeral Largely Attended-Under Masonic and Military Auspices.

His Watch, Money and Ring Still Un-

accounted For.

The more the sad affair in which Robert Hewson met his death was discussed by friends of the young man at the inquest, the further away they appeared to get from a solution of the mystery. When the body was stripped it was noticed that a ring was missing from one of the hands. This was not calculated to allay the suspicions of those who believe in the theory of foul play. Dr. Mitchell examined the body at the morgue, and said that deceased had not a vital injury in any portion of the body, other than where the wheels passed over. The whole contingent of soldiers from the barracks must have visited Ferguson's yesterday and taken a look at the remains of their dead ex-comrade. A brother, Wm. Hewson, of Jarvis, Ont., was summoned by a telegram, and arrived while the inquest was in progress during the afternoon. He is a middle-aged man, and was very much affected by the sight of the mangled remains in the back room. Another brother, Frank, is a yardmaster on the G. T. R. at Windsor, and was also sent for, and arrived last night. The only evidence taken at the inquest yesterday was that of Canteen Sergt. Cockburn and Mr. Fred Toll. The former told of Hewson's visit to the barracks on Monday and

his request that witness should stand up with him AT HIS WEDDING in April. The latter witness, Toll, was riding on the pilot of the engine as it backed to the roundhouse, and first noticed the body as the engine was receding from it, and the rays of the headlight shone on the form of a man lying across the rails. When the engine stopped he hurried back to the spot with Pat Kinsella, night call man, and Maurice McPhee, night operator. "I found Hewson lying across the track with his head pointing north," said McPhee yesterday afternoon. "He was just breathing his last as we got to him, as I could still feel his pulse

faintly. Of course, he never spoke." "Do you think that Hewson could have been struck at the crossing as the train passed down the yard?" was asked of Kinsella. "No," he replied; "because the train went down on the main line and the
