

The Angio-Belgian Deal.

BERLIN, June 3 .- The Imperial Government's attitude to the last Anglo-Belgium several newspapers it has been asserted needed, and urged the association to suswith a pretense of authority that Germany has sent a protest to Brussels. The French expedition, which is now marching from the French Congo territory towards Bah rel Chazel, will not be deterred, under instructions from Minister Hanotaux, from occupying territory which England holds only upon paper rights. The Earl of Kimberley, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, received a communication from M. Decrais, French ambassador to England, explicitly declaring that France holds the Ang.o-Belgian agreement as invalid, and it is absurd to assume in the face of this notification that the commander of the French expedition has not received instructions to occupy the disputed territory. It is the opinion of officials of the Foreign Office that everything points to the ultimate reference of the matter to an international conference or a board of arbitration, but it is a question whether the bellicose Dupuy will

assent to either. The World's Y. M. C. A.

London, June 3. - The second day's conference of the Young Men's Christian Association of all lands opened at Exeter Hall at 9:30 a.m. yesterday. The central international committee nominated the following officers, who were unanimously elected: President, Sir George Williams (founder of the Y. M. C. A.); vice-presidents, Count Bernstoff, Alfred Andre, Prince Oscar of Sweden and Norway and H. Thane Miller. Among the honorary vice-presidents chosen are: Cornelius Vanderbilt, of New York; John Wanamaker, of Philadelphia, and Morris K. Jessup, of New York. I. E. Brown, of Chicago, was made the American secretary.

The president made a brief address immediately after taking the chair and then appointed the committees. Among the members on the report of the central international committee are Robert R. Mc-Burney, of New York, and D. A. Budge, of Montreal. At 11 o'clock the first topic of the conference, "The necessity for the presence and power of the Holy Spirit in associations and their work," was opened in English by Rev. Prebendary H. B. Webb, of London; in French by Pastor George Appia, of Paris, and in German by Pastor Krummacher, of Elberfeldt. One hour was given to these addresses.

The central international committee presented its triennial report, giving in detail the work of the committee since the Amsterdam convention three years ago. The report shows that there are over 5,000 associations with nearly 500,000 members. Edward Barde, of Geneva, Switzerland, presented the report of the treasurer of the central committee for the and 1893. It showed that \$4,500 had been expended during the last year, the larger part of which came from American and English friends of the committee.

Reports were made by delegates from different countries giving the important features of association work in each. The report for America said there were now in America 1,400 associations, employing 1,200 secretaries, owning 800 buildings and property to the value of \$18,000,000. The report referred to the influence of the 450 college associations and to the hearty support which the 100 railroad associations are receiving from rallroad officials and to the prominence given to athletics and to the ducational department.

The Rev. H. Bach spoke for France. After telling of the growth of the work in France, he referred to the helpful influence of the American friends in the work of the Paris association, and to the elegant building there, largely the gift of American friends. He mentioned James Stokes, of New York, with especially warm words.

Christian Klug spoke for Germany. At 7 o'clock the evening session opened in Exter Hall. The subject was, "Association work for young men in foreign missionary lands." David McConneghy, formerly secretary of the Philadelphia Association, and now secretary of the Madras, India, Association, and also secretary of the Indian National Council, spoke of the claims of the millions of young men of India and the growth in association work in that country. He gave an encouraging report of the local work in that country (Madras), where he had been secretary for three years, and in Calcutta, where J. Campbell White, representative of the American committee, is secretary. He referred to the last national convention in India, and the stimulus it had given the work all over the country. There are now 74 associations in India. He said the agreement concerning possessions in American committee proposed sending a Africa, has not yet been decided. Wishard, secretary of the American international committee, who spoke of his tour around the world in the interest of the association work. He had visited China, Japan, Malaysia, Siam, Burmah, Ceylon, India, Arabia, Caucasia, Persia, Kurdistan, Asia Minor and Cyprus. He said the student class in the East is, and will be, as it everywhere is, the controlling influence in political and religious work. In China and Japan Government offices are held almost exclusively by college graduates, and if this class of men is reached with religious influence we will reach these nations. Christian associations are at work in Japan, China, Ceylon and India.
