MCGILLIVRAY.
Parkhill, Aug. 7.—The sad death of Mr. George C. Neale, V. S., of Greenacres, Ind., son of the late Mr. John Neale, of McGillivray, caused much regret in this neighborhood, where the deceased was well and favorably known. He had been ill only a short time, his death being due to typhoid fever. On Tuesday the body arrived here for interment, and was met at the station by the Parkhill I. O. P. 156, of which court he was a member, and many of the citizens, who marched in a procession to the cemetery, where the remains were interred. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved widow and other relatives. It is only a year or two since Dr. Neale was married to Miss Aggie Milne, a popular public school teacher in this township, daughter of Mr. W. Milne, a respected Delaware farmer. With two little children she is left to mourn the death of a kind and loving husband and father.

STRATHROY.
Strathroy, Aug. 7.—The news of the sudden death of Mr. Milton Haight, mathematical master of the Strathroy Collegiate Institute, will be learned with surprise and much regret by a large circle of friends. Shortly after the school term closed deceased went to Waterville to visit his brothers and uncle, Dr. J. H. Webb. In the course of a short illness typhoid fever de-

veloped, and being taken to the hospital for treatment he was thought to be recovering nicely until only a short time before his death. Tuesday evening at 9 o'clock the doctor had not the least fear of the patient, but an hour later he passed away. Death is supposed to have been caused by the formation of a blood clot. The remains were taken to Newmarket for interment. Deceased leaves a widow and one child to mourn his loss. Mr. Haight came to Strathroy about two years ago, during which time he made many warm friends, and was always identified with any movement tending to advance the town's interests. The Presbyterian Church, of which the deceased was a valued member, will feel his loss keenly.

The roads in the vicinity of Strathroy are now in splendid condition. Front Street Methodist Sunday school scholars and teachers are in Delaware today enjoying a picnic. Daily-decorated rigs conveyed the happy young people to the grounds, where, no doubt, a jolly time will be spent. Going through the streets the youngsters made things decidedly lively.

Mrs. Langevin's Letter.

Trenchant Criticism by Hon. Mr. Tarte's Paper—Some of the Statements in the Letter Declared Contrary to Fact.

Montreal, Aug. 7.—This is what La Cultivateur (Hon. Mr. Tarte's paper) has to say about the latest utterances of the Archbishop of St. Boniface.

"At the time of his visit to Paris, Mr. Langevin addressed to La Croix, a journal which professes religion, a political manifesto against Mr. Laurier and the Liberal party in Canada. This prelate, whose lack of discretion the happy young people to the grounds, such deplorable blunders in his own country, to the detriment of the Catholic and French cause, has evidently not been made any wiser by recent events. He belongs to the class of those who do not wish to, or cannot, learn anything, to those Cardinal Newman classes in the category of imprudent persons, who set fire to the building and leave to others the work of putting it out. Mr. Langevin told La Croix things which are absolutely contrary to facts. To mention but one only, it is false to say that Mr. Laurier ever pronounced himself in favor of the principle of neutral schools. We suppose that a bishop is no more allowed than any other person, to express his own opinions of a public man. Now Mr. Langevin knows that the Premier has, over and over again, expressed himself in a sense that can leave no place for ambiguity. He is in favor of religious teaching in the schools. He said so in twenty speeches. We wish to repeat that Mr. Langevin is wrong in his statement. To say that Mr. Laurier is a Freemason, as the Archbishop of St. Boniface knows that Mr. Laurier is not a Freemason. Fortunately, Mr. Langevin represents himself, and no other, in the deplorable attitude which he continues to hold. We request our fellow-citizens of all creeds and colors to be on their guard against the influence of his words and of his acts upon the Catholics of Manitoba. The second error of Manitoba was almost unanimously opposed to the elevation of Mr. Langevin to the Archbishopric of St. Boniface. We trust that the Vatican, he will not succeed in leading anyone into error."

BURNED OUT

Destitute Fire at Buckingham, Que.—350 Men Thrown Out of Work.

St. Catharines, Ont., Aug. 7.—About 2:30 a.m. yesterday fire was discovered at the residence of Mr. Henry James, on Haynes street. The James family are away at present. Mr. Rogers, of Horner, owned the house. It contained completely destroyed, and the contents of a storehouse, which was burned last night.

"Buckingham, Que., Aug. 7.—Ross Bros' mills were burned last night. On mills estimated at about \$50,000, on which was a roll of cotton, to be pretty well covered by insurance. About 350 men will be thrown out of employment. Origin of fire unknown.

NAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Aug. 7.—The site of the one destroyed a year ago, was itself in turn burned this morning. Loss \$20,000, partly insured. The playhouse was only part of the structure, which also was occupied by a dazzer and restaurant. It had been used a few hours before to big off a prize-fight. The International Hotel, which adjoins the theater on the east side, was seriously threatened. While the theater was occupied in keeping the flames from consuming the hotel the fire spread across the street and began making havoc among the trinkets in Tugby's Museum. The new Park Hotel adjoining the museum, and two frame buildings also caught fire. The latter were badly damaged. The museum was practically gutted, but the fire was not permitted to spread.

RIOTING IN CLEVELAND

Rifles Against Revolvers—A Soldier Shot.

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 6.—A militia man was shot on Luther street, in the east end, early this morning, between midnight and 1 o'clock, and a building, where a man named Johnson, who is employed at the Brown Hoisting works, lives. They broke in the windows and yelled like Indians. The soldiers heard the noise, and rushed to the scene. Part of the crowd scattered, but a dozen men stood at bay with revolvers and fired at the militiamen. The soldiers replied with rifle balls, and then the men scattered. In the melee Private Perkins, of Company B, was shot, but it is not known how seriously. He was taken away in an ambulance.

A GREAT GAMBLER'S DOWNFALL

Chicago, Aug. 7.—George V. Hankins, the former king of Chicago gamblers, has gone "broke." Everything he owned, even to his residence, has been turned over to his former business associate, M. C. McDonald, \$1,300,000 in realty, having been transferred on Monday.

SIR RICHARD'S VIEWS.

The Minister of Trade and Commerce on the Situation—Reforms to be Pushed—The Protests.

Kingston, Aug. 7.—Sir Richard Cartwright said to an interviewer yesterday that the people of South Oxford, who had just returned him by acclamation since his appointment to a portfolio in the Dominion Government, were rejoiced over the success of the Liberals, and now that they were in the sunlight expected an era of good government. "And it is our intention to give it to them," said Sir Richard. "We have had for years a programme of measures we have felt would be to the advantage of Canada, and I can assure you that we will put it into execution with all expedition. We are not looking about vaguely, wondering what is the best thing to do. We know, and the Liberal party knows, what its policy has been and what its chief purposes are for the benefit and progress of Canada."

Sir Richard intimated that before the close of the week there would be a full council meeting. The Ministers sworn in less than a month ago have had little time since then to do anything, but consider their re-election, and for the part have been scattered all over the country. Now they will begin to return to the capital, and the council will consider many and varied topics, some of which, of course, have been sealed and settled by correspondents before the Cabinet Ministers have considered them.

"What about the coming session?" Sir Richard said it might be short or long. "That depends," he said, "upon the attitude of the gentlemen of the Opposition. The session is held to pass the supply bill, and that can be done with due expedition or prolonged, as the other side of the House deem desirable. Then, too, the question whether the House will be prorogued, or only adjourned to the usual time next year, will depend upon the length of the session and other circumstances." The Minister said that as soon as the session was over the duties of the session would be considered and with great care. The opinions and suggestions of the manufacturers, trades, etc., would undoubtedly be laid before the board, to whom the subject would be referred, and the wishes of those concerned duly considered. From the remarks of the Minister it is not likely that the board will go on a tour, like their predecessors did, discussing the questions in a way to secure party capital.

Sir Richard is in fine fettle for the coming session. His health is good, his constitution robust, though now and then he suffers from rheumatism and pain. When found in his office he was reading the report of Ontario protests and expressing surprise at the way things had gone for the Liberals, not a single petition having been entered against members of the party, but eleven put in against Conservatives. Sir Richard said that "No" with emphasis, and asked if reports were true that attributed to him a hand in arranging "sav-ous."
