Now for the Vote.

BERLIN, June 11.—At the general elections for members of the Reichstag, to be held on Thursday next, and at the bye-elections there are sure to be required 397 members of the House, and the full complement will be returned. The week closed with 1,550 candidates in the field. Not only new aspirants for scats, but new political factions appear daily, and as election day draws nearer the confusion grows worse confounded. Little can be done in the few days that will elapse before the pelling to disentangle the intricate web that has been woven by the many factions. Instead of the eight recognized parties in the late Reichstag holding the electral field, in the present campaign there are about twenty factions, each fighting for its own programme. These programmes often agree on some one common point, but on other points they cross and recorass in such confusing demands that it would be a difficult, if not impossible task to say

what any single faction really wants. It seems impossible now that the result of Thursday's balloting will decide how the Reichstag will be constituted. Judging from the present outlook it is shought that the vote in most of the constituencies will be so split up that re-ballots will be necessary in two-thirds of them.

The confidence felt by the Government recently that it would find a majority of the new Reichstag ready to accept a compromise army bill, has vanished gradually before the approach of the decisive day, and its newspaper organs now speak in an uncertain tone which is interpreted generally as ominous of Chancellor Von Caprivi's defeat.

Prince Bismarck's Hamburg News avoids all discussion of the constitutional question, although urging the inexpediency of starting a struggle between the Government and the representatives of the people. It warns the Emperor and Chancellor that even though they be supported by the Federal Council they would shake by such a struggle confidence in the stability of the Empire both at home and abroad. "Nothing in the constitution prevents the Reichstag from refusing to vote the budget," says the News, "although such action might be contrary to the spirit of the constitution." The prevalence of such discussion of a possible conflict between the Government and Reichstag is regarded by the Liberal and Radical politicians as a sure sign that the Emperor will not yield on the Army Bill no matter how great may be the majority against in the new Parliament. They say he and his Chancellor are determined to take their stand upon the letter of the constitution and there to hold fast until the Reichstag gives up.

Hot Biaze in Strathroy Lumber Yards

STRATHROY, June 11.—Fire was discovered last evening about 7:15 in J. Ivor & Sons' packing houses just north of the depot.
