encore the Andante movement from Mendelssohn's Concerto, op. 18, given. De Benoit's Eighth Concerto, with its wonderful second movement, followed here. Mr. Poure's delicate and skilful up and down playing, sustaining the note to an indefinite degree, was the marked feature in a brilliant performance of Wieniawski. Perhaps the most interesting number of the programme was the original Mazurka for violin and piano by Mr. Thomas Mitchell, which was accompanied by the composer himself. It was a very dainty and striking composition, and was rendered with much effect; but the most brilliant effort of the programme was the triple number at the close, which consisted of Wieniawski's Capriccio Valse, Vieuxtemps's Reverie, and Ovide Musin's Mazurka de Concert, three compositions so well contrasted in style and movement, and interpreted with such a quick and sympathetic change of treatment, that they won the admiration and enthusiasm of the audience. Poure responded to the enthusiastic recall by giving Souvenir de Posen. Mr. Thomas Mitchell added to the beauty and interest of the programme by his recital of two of his own compositions, a Berceuse and a Waltz Romantic. Miss Blanche Teeple, the 11-year-old contralto, delighted the audience by her remarkable singing of the duet by, from Jocelyn, giving as an encore "Sleep, Little Baby of Mine." This was followed by a group of Nevill's songs, and for encore, Miss Teeple sang "Don't Cry." As a final number Miss Teeple sang Danza's "Daisy Time," a difficult composition, which she executed with brilliancy and brilliancy, replying to a double encore with "I Think When I Hear the Sweet Story of Old."

RECEPTION COST BUT LITTLE
Civic Committee Closes Up Matters Effecting Port Huron Reception.

The reception committee met last night and closed up matters affecting the recent Port Huron excursion to this city. The bills presented totalled \$177.78. The committee passed votes of thanks to Manager Carr, who provided for the trip, and to the Port Huron city, and to Dr. McCallum, superintendent of the asylum. The committee will invite Mr. J. A. Straith, manager of the Standard, to visit the city, and to meet them at an early date. The company is contemplating moving to some other center.

SUPERANNUATION FUND
No. 3 Committee Receive Reports Regarding It.

No. 3 committee received from Chief Roe and Ald. Campbell last night a report upon the proposal to establish a superannuation fund in connection with the fire department. Copies of the constitutions of similar societies in other cities were given the committee by Chief Roe, who suggested that the constitution followed by the Toronto firemen be adopted here. He said that the city would be required to make an initial contribution of \$1,000 and about \$600 a year afterward. The firemen would contribute 5 per cent of their wages after they had been raised 5 per cent.
The annual grant proposed was deemed too large by some of the committee. It was shown that the grant to the policemen's fund is only \$250, though they are twice as numerous. A committee will consider the matter further.
They discussed also the condition of the trees throughout the city. Ald. Winnick said that they should be trimmed, and suggested that a bylaw be passed to that effect. Engineer Graydon said that there were too many trees on some of the streets, and advised that they be thinned out. No definite action was taken.

WILL TEACH AT KNOX COLLEGE.
Rev. Dr. Johnston, at a meeting of St. Andrew's Church congregation last night, was granted leave to attend Knox College at Toronto and teach classes in homiletics and pastoral theology. It was moved by Mr. A. A. Cass, seconded by Mr. R. A. Little, that the application of Rev. Dr. Johnston to the board of Knox College, which requested the services of Dr. Johnston, be granted. The meeting was largely attended and the above motion was passed unanimously. Mr. Malcolm Rowland, chairman of the board of management, occupied the chair. Short speeches were made by members of the congregation and by the pastor.

SUNK IN HARBOR MOUTH
Vessel Makes Exciting Race for Safety and Loses.

Ludington, Mich., Sept. 4.—After one of the most exciting races against time ever run on Lake Michigan, the steamer Hattie B. Pereue lies sunk at the entrance to Ludington Harbor, with its deckload of lumber gone, while a high southwest sea beats over it. The steamer had almost reached safety when it went to the bottom, a tug having answered its distress for assistance and towed it almost into the harbor. The Pereue's trouble came off Big Point St. Ignace. Late in the night the steamer began leaking fast and soon became water logged. Capt. John Kenning kept the boat's pumps working steadily and headed for this port, following whistles of distress as he approached. Off Ludington the steamer's decks became covered and the fires were extinguished, but there was hope of reaching safety, as the tug had taken its line and was working hard to get it into port. The boat is owned by C. Marsh, of Chicago, and Capt. Kenning and the fourteen members of the crew are Chicagoans. All are safe.

ROBBERS IN STREET CAR
A Man's Marvelous Experience in Chicago.

Set Upon by Ruffians—No One Tried to Help Him.

Chicago, Sept. 3.—In a crowded street car, while 50 people were looking on, four men attempted to rob a passenger at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. When the victim discovered that they were in the act of lifting his watch and purse from his pockets and resisted them, the four men attacked and beat him severely. One arrest was made by the police, who are looking for the others of the quartet.

The victim of the hold-up men was W. S. Meyer, of 211 East Thirty-first street. He boarded a north-bound Indiana avenue car at Fortieth street, and took a rear seat. At the next corner a number of people got on, and the car was so crowded that the aisle was filled. Four men soon entered and two of them sat on each side of Meyer. They began to read newspapers and further than that they paid no attention to him.

FIGHTS FOR HIS VALUABLES.
As the car was approaching Thirty-sixth street, Meyer felt a tug at his vest-pocket. Glancing down he saw the hand of the man on his left taking his watch, while the man on his right was just removing his purse from an inside coat pocket. Meyer grabbed the hands that were taking his property, and tried to regain it. No sooner had the struggle for the purse and watch started than the four men attacked him severely. One arrest was made by the police, who are looking for the others of the quartet.

This attracted the attention of all the passengers, who, with the conductor, watched the struggle, Meyer says. Without offering to help him, the passengers nearest the hold-up men and their victim tried to get out of the way of the combatants until all were crowded together in the north end of the car, while Meyer and his assailants struggled in the rear. Meyer clung to his watch and money, although struck many times. The fight continued until the threats and oaths of the pickpockets threw the women into a panic, and their screams were heard by a detective a block away, who ran toward the car.

TRY TO THROW VICTIM OUT.
When the car was stopped at Thirty-sixth street the four men, who had beaten Meyer until he was almost insensible, attempted to throw him out of the car, but he held fast. Then the men fled, leaving the watch and purse in his possession.

The detective saw and pursued them. After a chase of three blocks one man was overtaken. He gave his name as E. F. Woolford. He was locked up at the central station. The others escaped.

Meyer was taken to his home. He was badly bruised about the head and on the left shoulder and hips.

Held, that it was impossible to hold the township liable because of the unprecedented fall of snow at that particular season, and in endeavoring to extricate it, it being practically impossible for the township to keep the eight miles of roadway clear of snow. The action was dismissed with costs. The case was tried in Sarnia.
