WAR IN SUMATRA

Big Battle in Which 541 Achinese
Were Wiped Out.

Amsterdam, April 4.—A dispatch to the
Telegraph from Kota Raja, island of
Sumatra, announced that a column of
Dutch troops operating in Achin (North
Sumatra) engaged a strong entrenched
body of Achinese. In the Gajocoes dis-
trict, with the result that 541 Achinese
were killed. The Dutch lost three men
killed, and had 25 men wounded.

FARM HELP SCARCER.
The demand for farmers' helpers is
increasing to such an extent around
the Government bureau at the Union
station, Toronto, that many of the vi-
sitors refuse to accept the wages offered
and are demanding their own price.
The other morning there was the usual
number of farmers on hand looking for
help, and the applicants were indiffer-
ent about taking a position. A young
man refused \$250 a year with board.
The farmer raised it and board and
was refused, until he finally said:
"Well, if you have experience,
name your own price," and he
usually from \$120 to \$240 a year, with
board, according to experience. Man
and wife get \$225 and board a year
man with wife and family can get \$300
and board; of course, all members
of the family would be expected
to earn their share of the money. Mr.
Perrine, the Government agent, says:
"I never remember anything like
the demand for farm help before. I
have over 200 applications from
farmers on hand at present, and can-
not fill them."

THE SNOW RECORD.
The records of the Toronto weather
bureau are to the effect that win-
ters in Canada are not always over by
the first of May much less the first of
April, and it is justly famous for its
train from making flower beds and put-
ting out plants for some time yet. In
1899 and 1892 there were snow furries
as late as May 20. In 1898 there was
snow on the 30th day of May, and in
1893 the natural product for which
the city is so justly famous was frozen
as late as the fourth day of the leafy
month of June. In 1895 and 1890 it
snowed on May 14. Though these
were the most part merely fur-
ries, in 1875, on May Day, there was a
fall of three inches. Last year we had
a fall of one inch on May 1st, and this
month the mean temperature has been
24.9 or 4-10ths of a degree below the
normal for March. The snowfall has
been just half an inch or just over an
inch. There have been 2.22 inches of
rain, while the average is 1.48 inches.
