RECIPROCITY TO BE TALKED OVER

Leaders of American Political Parties to Confer on Tariff Revision.

Washington, July 18.—Unusual interest is manifested by the Government and the people in the national reciprocity conference to be held in Chicago Aug. 15 and 16.

While it is true that the Government will not be represented directly and officially, President Roosevelt undoubtedly will be asked to be present, and there is no certainty that he will not accept the invitation.

There is the air of a belief among public men that some sort of tariff revision will be undertaken at the next session of Congress.

The President personally favors such action, although with wise deference to the views of the congressional gray-beards he thus far has avoided pushing the subject to the front.

Massachusetts Republicans are starting out on a campaign which will be openly for reciprocity, and Governor Douglas, Democrat, intends to make a campaign this year strictly on the tariff basis, without any regards to his own candidacy.

The deficiency in revenue has induced even ardent supporters to suggest the return to stamp duties, as the files of internal revenue show, were more profitable than any other of the war revenue taxations.

There is a growing belief here that the reciprocity conference in Chicago may become an entering wedge in precipitating upon the country a general fiscal decision.

Throughout New England, and particularly in portions of Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, there is a strong sentiment in favor of a broad gauge reciprocity system to be inaugurated between the United States and Canada.

This sentiment is local to a large extent, and due, first, to the presence in New England of a large number of Canadian immigrants, and secondly, to the close trade relations between New England and the northeastern Canadian provinces.
