ALL WORK ON THE BREAKWATER WILL NOT BE DONE THIS YEAR

Board Does Not Want to Overdraw Appropriation—Will Fix Dangerous Place.

The board of works ascertained last night just exactly where it stood in the matter of breakwater expenditures. The board intended to have the protecting wall strengthened from Blackfriars bridge to the Oxford street bridge; that section being considered very dangerous, but when the tenders were opened and outlays already made were considered, it was found that to extend the contract to the lowest bidder would mean an overdraft of \$12,000 or more. The Forest City Paving Company tendered to build the wall between the two bridges for \$2,500,000. The board figure being \$3,500. To accept the latter would mean a total outlay of \$16,153 on the breakwater, which would be \$1,153 in excess of the appropriation. The board, however, decided to have the work done in sections, and not to award contracts for anything in excess of \$2,000. This, City Engineer Graydon says, will permit of the most dangerous points being made perfectly secure, and it is hoped that time leave the board on the safe side of the \$15,000. In addition to some of the work there will remain to be done next year, but the board is willing to wait the foot of the Wharfedale road, which will cost about \$500.

What Mr. Reid Wants.

Mayor Campbell informed the board that he had wanted on Mr. W. J. Reid in reference to the raising of the fence at Tecumseh Park, and the purchase of a fifteen-foot strip of land on the west side of the breakwater, in the neighborhood of the ball park. Mr. Reid absolutely refused to transfer to the city the southeast corner of the ball park in return for the raising and improvement of the fence, but he was willing to sell the fifteen-foot strip inside the

breakwater for \$600; to have the fence raised and improved to the satisfaction of Engineer Graydon and to turn over to the city gratis the piece of land in the corner. The raising of the fence would cost at least \$400, making the total \$1,000. The only question was whether it would be wise for the city to expend the money on the fence, and in addition to that, running the risk of a lawsuit over the fence and being taxed for more than \$400. The price asked for the land is about the same as was paid for other land for breakwater purposes.

The matter was laid over until the next meeting, the committee being favorable to its acceptance.

Another Claim for Damages.

The petition of Beaconsfield avenue ratepayers, to have the walk on the north side of the street extended to the Wharfedale road and also to have the street graded, as promised by the street railway company, was laid over pending a report by the city engineer.

Mr. Graydon will also report on the application of Mrs. Morgan, for damages for injuries sustained by an alleged defective lamp on Clarence street. By a fall, Mrs. Morgan sustained a broken wrist. She holds the city responsible for the accident.

Two tenders were accepted for the painting of the Dundas street bridge, but none was accepted, the committee being of the opinion that it was too late in season to have the work done. The tenders ranged from \$170 to \$225. W. R. Bird being the lowest.

The committee took no action on the appointment of Miss Clagston as stenographer in the city engineer's office. Although he disclaimed, Miss Clagston from the city's employ, Mr. Graydon assumed and secured her appointment as stenographer in the telephone office.

Alma Foristal (chairman), Gerry, Garratt and Wyatt, Mayor Campbell, Engineer Graydon and secretary Bell were present.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND THEIR WORK

Baptists Take Up Vital Subject in Convention.

REPORT OF PUBLICATION BOARD

The Lord's Day Alliance Ask Denomination's Aid in Securing a Lord's Day Act.

The weather for yesterday morning's Baptist convention was still unfavorable, but despite this the Tabbot Street Church auditorium was filled. Several reports were submitted, discussed and adopted, which constituted the morning's proceedings.
