William A. Brady His Former Manager Offers Boilermaker \$10,000 Unconditionally.

IT'S ALL UP TO JAMES J.

New York, Nov. 10 .- The Herald this morning says: William A. Brady, who formerly managed James J. Jeffries, made an offer last night to give the retired heavyweight champion \$10,000 as a gift if he will fight Al Kaufman within 90 days.

Brady, who has had a serious falling out with his old protege, has said time and again that he believed Kaufman could beat Jeffries, and to give evidence of the sincerity of his ideas of the merits of the former and the latter after his long retirement, Brady posted \$10,000 with Max Blumenthal, to be given to Jeffries with no string whatsoever attached if he will go ter rounds against Kaufman. No stipulation is made as to event of Jeffries being beaten.

Jeff Can Make Conditions. Under the agreement which was made with Felix Isman, Jeffries is to get the sum merely for going into the other international cup race. ring against Kaufman. All the conditions are to be left to Jeffries.


