# IN INDO-CHINA

"Signed on behalf of the McCormick Reports Say Rupture With the Celestial Empire Also a Possibility.

> Pekin, Dec. 21.-Those who have watched the relations between the French and the Chinese since the troubles of 1884 and who are able to costrast present conditions with those of 26 years ago, are able to discern on the political horizon as a possibility by no means remote the outbreak of international differences.
