BREAKWATER MAY BE SWEEPED AWAY

West Londoner States That It Is In "Absolutely Rotten" Condition Now.

FOR THE RADIAL LINE

Members Believe That Dyke Would Be Strengthened if Roadbed Were Constructed.

That the breakwater erected to protect West London from flooding in the spring freshets is now in worse condition than at the time that section was annexed by the city was the declaration made during an informal discussion by members of the West London Improvement Association last evening.

"If the water ever trickles in during a spring freshet, the breakwater will be swept away like a hedge of mullein leaves, causing all the suffering that has been experienced here before," one member complained.

"The breakwater is not being kept in proper repair by the city. A little brush has been thrown in behind the dirt, but several sections are now absolutely rotten and would withstand no unusual pressure."

Members of the association decided to vigorously support any proposition to give a radial railway right-of-way into the city along the breakwater. West Londoners then had some assurance that the breakwater would be kept in repair for the reason that no company would allow its trackage to be washed away, was the consensus of opinion.

ESTEEMED RESIDENT DIES WHILE IRONING

Widow of Mr. Fred Harding Had Suffered From Valvular Heart Trouble.

Mrs. Mary Richards-Harding, widow of Mr. Fred Harding, died suddenly at her home, 154 Wreny street, on Tuesday, expiring as she was ironing.

Mrs. Harding had suffered for some time from valvular heart disease, but such a sudden demise was unexpected. Her daughter was present in the room, when she suddenly collapsed, but before help could be secured life was extinct.

Her husband, Mr. Fred Harding, died some months ago, his wife being so ill at the time that she was unable to be with him at his death.

Mrs. Harding is survived by two daughters and one son. They are Mrs. Percy Sheers, of Wexford, Miss Beatrice at home, and Mr. E. P. Richards, travelling for the John Garvey Company. Her mother, Mrs. Thomas Hicks, and one sister and four brothers, as well as relatives in Toronto and Winnipeg also survive.

Rev. Dean Davis will officiate at the funeral service at her late residence tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment will be made at Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

MAY BE OPPOSITION TO BRIDGE PLAN

Although Mr. Jeffrey Will Not Go to Toronto as Inferred at Meeting.

SEE COUNTY ENGINEER

Members of District Organization Are Interested in Bridge. He Will Build For \$21,000.

Despite the fact that the recent victory at the polls was discussed with jubilation, that the members of the West London Improvement Association are not yet certain that the bridge at the Wharfedale road, connecting West and South London, will be erected without a fight, was shown at the weekly meeting of the society held in Collins' hall last evening.

Several of the boosters declared that they had heard rumblings of opposition from property-owners of South London, and names were mentioned. Mr. R. A. Y. Stinchcombe alleging that it had come to his ears that Mr. C. L. Jeffrey, of the Ridgeway, planned to go to Toronto at his own expense to oppose that item in the city of London bill before Premier Whitney.

Mr. Stinchcombe, who was West London's aldermanic candidate, proffered the information that he will be at Toronto when the city of London bill is brought down, and he will then speak in the interests of the bridge. He further added that he will make the trip at his own expense.

Will Not Go to Toronto.

"While I have been opposed to the construction of the bridge, I have had no thought of going to Toronto or attempting to prevent its erection by any action," Mr. Jeffrey told The Advertiser when the matter was called to his attention today.

The matter of cost of constructing the bridge was discussed at length. Mr. Stinchcombe stating that he was able to inform the members that the street railway company is willing to pay a portion of the increased expenditure should the city care to build the bridge, and would be glad to take another span for railway purposes.

The members also desired to learn something about the plans prepared by County Engineer Talbot for a 300-foot bridge, at what is known as the Giles site between Delaware and Caradoc.

Mr. Talbot's estimates for that job showed that it would cost \$21,000 when completed with new approaches.

Bridges Same Length.

This is practically the same sum in hand for the West London job, and as both bridges are about 300 feet long, it is thought that the comparison would be of interest.

In reference to the street railway company's interest in the proposition the members foretold that within a few years the South London and Springbank lines would be emptied into the city through West London. It will not be long either, they claimed, before the West London line was continued along Oxford street to Richmond street, making another belt.

A motion was carried and will be forwarded to the city council, calling the attention of the mayor and aldermen to the abrupt turns in the car lines at both approaches to Kensington bridge. The street railway company will be asked to remedy the trouble, if possible.

COUNTY BUILDINGS DECLARED UNSUITABLE

Grand Jurors Say Rooms Should Be Modern and Properly Heated and Ventilated.

The report of the grand jury on the inspection of the Asylum for Insane, Victoria Hospital and the county jail and court house, was submitted this morning to Sir William Meredith, chief justice of the common pleas division of the high court of justice.

After reporting favorably on the state of affairs in the asylum and Victoria Hospital, the jury added in reference to the condition of the county buildings:

"We, your grand jurors, consider the county buildings, especially the court room and the rooms provided for the jurors, unsuitable for the requirements of the County of Middlesex or city of London, the buildings being thoroughly inadequate for the comfort of anyone connected with the business of the court during inclement weather. We notice repairs are being made and have under way for months. It is to be sincerely desired that these repairs should be completed at the earliest possible moment. But we, your grand jurors, are entirely of the opinion that modern, properly heated and ventilated rooms are an absolute necessity, and should be provided without further delay for the use of the court and county officers."

Merchandise observed that the question of dealing with the insane of the province had yet to be solved. The establishment of a psychopathic hospital for the cure of tendencies in insanity was greatly needed, although the cost would be very great.

In view of the defective conditions of the county jail, their report gave evidence that the jail was well managed. The question of providing work for the convicts remained to be solved. Suitable work and ordinary clothes for convicts would, he thought, do much to reform them.

BRIGADE OF INFANTRY ORDERED TO PERSIA

Calcutta, India, Jan. 11.—Orders have been issued today to the brigade of infantry stationed at Ahmadnagar to hold itself in readiness to proceed immediately to Persia.

Reports as to the dangers incurred by merchants travelling over the trade routes in the southern provinces of Persia have led to this step being taken.

The brigade which is a strong one of three battalions belongs to the Sixth or Poona division of the southern army of India, and is under the command of Col. Gastrell, who holds the temporary rank of brigadier-general. The troops composing the brigade consist of one British battalion, the First Royal Dublin Fusiliers and two Indian battalions, the One Hundred and Third Madras Light Infantry and the One Hundred and Twenty-third Rifles.

The constant attacks on traders in Persia led to the dispatch of squadrons of two regiments of Indian cavalry in December, and it was while these troops were en route that the British consul at Shiraz, W. A. Smart, reported that they were attacked by tribesmen and lost six killed and eleven wounded. A detachment of Indian Cavalry was sent to Shiraz, which will be the theatre where the present expedition will disembark after travelling by sea from Kurrachee.

NOT CARING FOR COWS COSTS \$20,000,000

Speaker at Dairyman's Convention Urges the Need of Proper Tests.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Ingersoll, Jan. 11.—That more than \$20,000,000 is lost every year through farmers and dairymen not properly looking after and testing their cows was the startling statement made at the big dairyman's convention here today by H. B. Dean.

He showed that it cost only \$1.50 to pay well, to test cows regularly, and weed out those that are not producing as they should. He quoted an instance where a test had been made, and it was found that by looking after one cow properly more milk was obtained than had been secured from an ordinary herd of five.

Interesting figures regarding the relative value of cows in milk were quoted. Mr. Dean stated that it had usually been considered that the amount of casin was a constant quantity. Recent experiments, however, show that it is not by any means constant, and is largely increased by proper care and attention.

Secretary Frank Hens gave a most interesting address on the proper cooling of milk. He stated that when the night and morning milk are mixed the mixture should be kept at a temperature of about 65, while if the milk is kept over Sunday better results are obtained if a temperature of 60 is maintained. Milk gathered at night should be kept at about 65.

SPLENDID YEAR FOR CAR WORKS LIBRARY

Report of Secretary-Treasurer Shows Extensive Circulation of Books and Magazines.
