

## BRIGADE OF INFANTRY ORDERED 10 PERSIA

[Canadian Press.]

Calcutta, British India, Jan. 11 .- Orders have been issued today to the brigade of infantry stationed at Ahmadnagar to hold itself in readiness to roceed immediately to Persia, Reports as to the dangers incurred y merchants travelling over the trade routes in the southern provinces of

Persia have led to this step being taken. The brigade which is a strong one of three battalions belongs to the Sixth or Poona division of the southern army of India, and is under the command of Col. Gastrell who holds the temporary rank of brigadier-general. troops composing the brigade consist of one British battalion, the First Royal Dublin Fusiliers and two Indian battalions, the One Hundred and Third Mahratta Light Infantry and the One

Hundred and Twenty-third Rifles. The constant attacks on traders in Persia led to the dispatch of squadrons of two regiments of Indian cavalry in December, and it was while troopers were escorting the British consul at Shiraz, W. A. Smart, to his post that they were attacked by tribesmen and lost six killed and elevenwounded. Immediately afterward a strong detachment of Indian Carnatic infantry was sent to Bushire, which will be the port where the present expedition will disembark after travelling by sea from Kurrache.
