FEAR THAT STEFANSSON AND HIS ENTIRE PARTY WERE LOST IN STORM

Nothing Has Been Seen or Heard of Canadian Arctic Exploration Party for Many Weeks.

Whalers Say There Is Little Hope of the Explorers' Vessel Ever Being Discovered.

[Canadlan Press.] New York, Nov. 19 .- The New York Sun publishes the following special from Seattle, Wash .:

Villijalmur Stefansson, Arctic explorer and discoverer of the white Eskimo, who was aboard the steamship Kartuk, when that vessel was last sighted off Flaxman Island, Aug. 14, possibly is lost, as is the vessel and all of her people.

Nothing has been seen or heard of the Kartuk since that date, despite the fact that extensive search has been made for her. Whalers say there is little hope of her ever being discovered as she is known to have encountered the heavy weather which prevailed off the Alaskan coast early in October.

This is the opinion of members of the Canadian Arctic exploration party at Collision Point, according to a dispatch received from Fairbanks today.

Stefansson left Victoria last summer with an expedition outfitted by the Canadian Government to make explorations and scientific research along the northern coast of the American continent.
