LIBERALS READY FOR HOT FIGHT IN NORTH GREY

Owen Sound, July 2. — A splendid crowd, which was at all times enthusiastic, gathered tonight in the town hall for the opening meeting in the North Grey by-election. Mr. William Proudfoot was the principal speaker, and was given a great reception. His first words were a felicitous reference to Hon. A. G. MacKay, whose removal to Alberta made the holding of an election necessary. It was a matter of great regret that the able assistance of Mr. MacKay was being lost to the Province of Ontario. The mention of the name of the former Liberal leader evoked loud cheers, and repeated references to his name during the evening were always met with enthusiastic responses.

Scores Whitney.
The Opposition in the Legislature, Mr. Proudfoot proceeded, had been able during the past few years to point out a number of misdeeds on the part of the Whitney Government. "I intend to refer to some of these misdeeds before I am through tonight," said the member for Owen Sound. "I wish Sir James Whitney and Mr. Hanna were here to listen. I defy Sir James Whitney and Mr. Hanna," he continued, "to appear on this platform during this present campaign and discuss the issues that I raised in the Legislature last session." (Cheers.)

HEAVY LOSSES ON BOTH SIDES IN THE BALKANS

Bulgarians Defeated All Along Line With Thousands Killed.

Bulgaria Has Sent Serbia and Greece What Amounts to an Ultimatum.

London, July 3. — Any remaining hope of a peaceful Balkan war is rapidly disappearing. Bulgaria has sent warning notes to Serbia and Greece demanding a cessation of all aggressive movements within 24 hours. These notes are regarded as tantamount to an ultimatum.

A Belgrade dispatch, via Paris, announces that the King of Serbia is presiding at a council, which is expected to decide to declare war on Bulgaria.

Greece in notes to Bulgaria and the powers justifying her action, accuses Bulgaria of treacherously attacking the Greeks and Serbians in order to seize Serbian territories, and so place herself in an advantageous position in the coming negotiations for a settlement of the Balkan differences.

Fighting Continues.
In the meantime fighting continues according to Serbia's advice, on a heavy scale, and the King of Greece, with his staff, has left Salonica for the front to direct the operations personally.

The representatives of the powers at all the Balkan capitals are urgently pressing the respective governments not to allow unfortunate occurrences to drag them into war.

Thousands Killed.
Belgrade, July 2.—Army headquarters report that the Serbians, after capturing Istip, pursued the enemy, capturing over one hundred officers and one thousand men.

Press dispatches report that sanguinary fighting has occurred at Ovtchepolye, where the Bulgarian losses were enormous and 4,000 Bulgarians surrendered. In this engagement 3,000 Serbians were killed and wounded.

Helped Servians.
London, July 3.—A Belgrade dispatch to the Daily Telegraph reports that the Greeks went to the assistance of the Serbians, and after heavy fighting, recaptured Guevgueli. The Bulgarians met with real disaster when in an attack on the Serbian positions at Retkubuk, on the banks of the "Skevo" River, they attempted to capture the town by the bayonet. This failed, and the Bulgarians left behind a thousand dead and wounded.
