General De Wet in the late South African war was commander-i hief of the Orange Free State forces. He was commandant at Lady smith and was sent to relieve General Cronje as second in command after General Cronje's surrender he received full command. He was one of the signatories of the Vereenigin Peace Conference and was appointed Minister of Agriculture in 1907.

General De Wet was opposed to the Government's action in regard

o the present war, and early in October attempted to speak at a meet ing held in protest of this action, but was prevented from doing so by demonstration of sympathizers of General Louis Botha, the premif the Union of South Africa.

Brigadier General Beyers was also a noted figure in the South African war and was chairman of the Vereenigin Peace Conference. Last September he resigned as commandant-general of the Union defence ce because of his disapproval of the action of Great Britain in send-commandoes to conquer German Southwest Africa.
