
Investigation has failed to reveal that the steamer was given warning of the proposed attack by the submarine, which appears to have been lurking off the Irish coast bent upon destroying the largest and fastest ship engaged in transatlantic traffic.

The lookouts sighted the periscope of a submarine a thousand yards away, and the next instant they saw the trail left by a torpedo as it flashed on its course. Then came a terrific crash as the missile pierced the liner's side, followed almost immediately by another which littered the decks with wreckage. The course of the liner was at once turned towards shore. Four torpedoes apparently were fired at the Lusttania, but only two of them found their mark.
