NERLICH FREED; JURY FINDS NO ACT OF TREASON

Brother Embraces Him, But Attempt at Demonstration Is Quelled—Zirnow's Narrow Escape.
TORONTO, June 11.—Emil Nerlich, on trial for treason, was late this afternoon pronounced not guilty by the jury after nearly six hours' deliberation. An attempt at demonstration in the court room was quickly quelled. Mr. Nerlich's brother publicly embraced him, and the late prisoner and the crown counsel shook hands.
Judge Sutherland said that while he might have committed for contempt of court Zirnow, crown witness, and the main centre of the prosecution, for tearing up a document in court, he had abstained from doing so in order that he might not prejudice the case against the accused. He added: "It seems to indicate what we have heard so much about lately, the absolute disregard of officers trained in the German army for all civil rights and customs."

Nearly Thirteen Million Acres Sown to Wheat
New Record for Canada—14.8 Per Cent Greater Than Last Year.

OTTAWA, June 11.—"The largest area ever sown to wheat in Canada," is how the census and statistics branch of the Canadian Government describes the present conditions, in a bulletin just issued.
The bulletin says: "Wheat is estimated to occupy this year a total of 12,896,000 acres, which is more by 1,662,150 acres, or 14.8 per cent, than the area sown for 1914, and by 2,062,140 acres, or 25 per cent, than the area harvested in 1914, the area sown for last year having been reduced by 925,600 acres, the estimated aggregate of total failures through the winter-killing of fall wheat (211,600 acres) and also drought affecting spring wheat (728,100 acres). Not only is the wheat area year under double stimulus of patriotic impulse and the prices, 25 per cent in excess of last year's harvested area, but it is also the largest area ever sown to wheat in Canada. As previously reported, the area to be harvested of fall-sown wheat in Canada is 1,208,700 acres, the balance of 11,687,300 acres having been sown this spring."

Austria To Take Whole Grain Crop When Harvested
Only Sufficient Will Be Left To Feed Rural Population.

GENEVA, via Paris, June 11.—3.30 p.m.—Information has reached here from Vienna to the effect that the war grain committee of the Austrian Government has announced that it will take under its control the entire harvest soon to be gathered. With the exception of sufficient grain to feed the rural population, the entire crop will be bought by the state.
The committee has given orders that no false reports concerning the condition of crops are to be circulated.

GERMANY AND U. S. CAN HARDLY REtain FRIENDLY SPIRIT

German Officials Are Pessimistic—Will Not Meet Wilson's Wish.
[Canadian Press.]
LONDON, June 12.—3.45 a.m.—German opinion is unanimously against granting President Wilson's demand for assurances that American ships and lives will not be endangered by submarine warfare, according to a Berlin dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company by way of Amsterdam.
Official circles are pessimistic, the dispatch says, regarding the continued maintenance of friendly relations with the United States.
Immediately after it had been received the contents of the American note were telegraphed by Foreign Minister Von Jagow to Emperor William, who is on the Italian front.

ONE BITTER COMMENT.
AMSTERDAM (via London), June 11.—4.25 p.m.—A dispatch from Berlin to the Cologne Volkszeitung, a copy of which has been received here, says: "Without doubt Mr. Lansing, in comparison with Mr. Bryan, is a man of very sharp tone, but the German press will do well not to inquire too anxiously whether he is a man of sharp or of peaceful tone."
"Our submarine war will not cease on that account. If American ships or Americans in British ships enter the war zone, they must, despite Mr. Lansing and President Wilson, take the risk involved in such a voyage. America can claim the right to judge neutrals' rights only when she herself maintains neutrality. Such was not the case under the president Mr. Bryan and probably will be just as little the case under the international law expert, Mr. Lansing."

BERLIN HEARS OF CRISIS IN THE RUSSIAN MINISTRY

BERLIN, June 11, via London, 11:25 p.m.—Reports to the Voossische Zeitung, indirectly from Petrograd, point to the possibility of a ministerial crisis and the retirement of Premier Gorevkin.
A meeting of Duma leaders last Saturday with President Michael Rodzianko in the chair, at which a request to the Emperor to convoke the Duma at an early date was adopted, had, according to the newspaper informants, the purpose of starting an agitation for a coalition ministry.
Prince Manuroff, the reports continue, presented a resolution that the Duma immediately after its convocation move an address to the Emperor, and demand a ministry in which Parliament would be represented. Members of the extreme right voted the resolution in principle, it is stated, and Prince Rodzianko went to the meeting after a long conference with Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian forces at headquarters.

CONVOCATION HELD AT HURON COLLEGE
Bishop of Huron Lauds Work of the Staff and Students.

A RECORD ATTENDANCE
Institution's Prospects for Future Rest With Graduates, Says Principal.

Convocation at Huron College was held yesterday afternoon. The Bishop of Huron presided and in opening the exercises he congratulated the staff and students on the work done in the college during the past term. The excellent standing of the students who, in the main, took office in the examinations in the arts department of Western University, was highly commented upon.
The principal's report, although it told of the effect the war had made in keeping several students away, who had signified their intention of becoming connected with the college, was optimistic. The number of students was larger than ever before in the history of the college. Actual enrollment had been 41. He referred briefly to the death of St. W. Brady, a Huron College man, who had given his life for Canada on the battlefields in France, and also of the other college men who were fighting at the front. Twelve men in all were serving with the Canadians either as members of the first, second or third contingents. That a larger number of the theological students were taking the arts course, was pleasing to the principal, and in the years to come an increasingly fewer number of those studying for the ministry would be allowed ordination, unless they were art bachelors. The standing of the men as shown in examination results was good. The tests had been made in fair. Prospects for the future of the college, the principal stated, rested in the hands of the graduates, for just in so much as the clergyman who made the living, brought forward more men who would take a course with the ministry in view, just in so far were they successful or unsuccessful in their calling.

Presentation of Prizes.
The presentation of prizes was made on the occasion for several short addresses by the clergymen who made the presentations. The Matthew Wilson gold medal for reading and general speaking was won by Reginald E. Charles, B. A., who had won the medal, and in giving it to Mr. Charles said the award was just and well deserved.
The Harnett reading prize, presented by Rural Dean Appleby, went to J. C. Mantell. The rural dean spoke shortly on the Prayer Book. He told of the great treasure the book of prayers was, and said to all the students present that the book should be prized thoroughly, and that to study it carefully in an historical and an experimental standpoint was essential, if they hoped to become the success in the church they should become.

The Harnett reading prize was shown to the students by the Bishop of Huron, who said it had been presented by Principal Waller, to be competed for yearly by students. The best standing of a student in an examination of if it was a student in the ministry, the presentation work, especially Christology, would be the test, and he who was successful would have his name engraved on the emblem and would possess it for one year. The cup would be known as the Charles Henry Waller memorial cup, and Rev. Canon Gunne, in a short address on Old Testament work, told of how the cup had been presented to the father of Principal Waller by the students and alumni of St. John's Hall, of Huron, who presented it.
General Proficiency Prize. The general proficiency prize in college work was won by Mr. Charles also, and Canon Gunne made the presentation. He gave a short address on

preaching, and emphasized the importance of the sermon to the preacher. "I hear clergymen say sermons come secondary," he said, "they should not be. The sermon is on the same level as the sacrament. Each is equally important. The best interpretation of the New Testament has made history in the world, and through the medium of preaching. Sanctified human personality is the greatest power in the universe. Great preachers are rare."
Dr. Brattwaite, president of Western University, addressed the students on the importance of arts work to the men studying theology. The method of work in the arts department, the acquisition of the knowledge a course in arts meant, and the pursuit of a subject in the search for wisdom, added to the additional mental equipment a student received from taking an arts course, proved of untold value in later work in the church.
Those students receiving their testimonials, which were read to each recipient by the principal and presented by the Bishop, were as follows: Reginald Metcalfe, A. A. Charles, J. C. Mantell, J. C. Simpson, and Rev. A. S. H. Cree.

Certificates on behalf of the General Synod for preliminary examinations for holy orders were received by Rev. A. S. H. Cree, Rev. H. C. Light, Reginald Metcalfe, Reginald E. Charles, J. C. Mantell, C. Simpson, Rev. J. S. Johnson, and J. C. Mantell. Those who wrote off supplementals and received certificates for these were Rev. P. J. R. Law, Rev. S. E. McKegney and J. L. Buchanan. The Bishop of Huron presented all certificates.

The following will be ordained as priests on Sunday: Rev. Messrs. Cree, Streeter, Hunt, Williams and Light. These will be ordained as deacons: C. Duplan, W. B. Moulton, C. Simpson, R. Charles, B. A., J. Cottam, H. B. Metcalfe, M. A., W. Jones and W. Ash-Everest.
Ven. Archdeacon Richardson opened the convocation yesterday, with prayer, and the singing of "O God Save the King" concluded the exercises.
