A meeting of Duma leaders last Saturday with President Michael Rodzianko in the chair, at which a request to the Emperor to convoke the Duma at an early date was adopted, had, according to the newspaper informants, the purpose of starting an agitation for a coalition ministry.

Prince Manuroff, the reports continue, presented a resolution that the Duma immediately after its convocation move an address to the Emperor and demand a ministry in which Parliament would be represented. Members of the extreme right voted the resolution in principle, it is stated, and Prince Rozianko went to the meeting after a long conference with Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian forces at headquarters.
