Mr. Bryan had led a field of four on the first ballot and of three on the second, when he came within 18 votes of election, but after all other candidates had withdrawn, Dr. Wishart forged ahead, winning by 451 to 427, with 439 votes needed to elect.





# NORTH BAY BANDIT KILLS CONSTABLE **DURING PURSUIT**

Leo Roger Also Wounds Other Officer in Fight.

FIRES FROM AMBUSH Posse on Trail of Youth Who Escaped From Prison Wednesday.

Canadian Press Despatch. North Bay, Ont., May 18.-Fred Lefebre died at 9:45 this morning from a bullet wound in the stomacn. He was conscious to the end and among his last words were, "Rogers got me at last." He received the last rites of the church about 7 o'clock. Rogers is still at large.

North Bay, May 18.—Leo Rogers, who escaped from the courtroom here on Wednesday, where he was to have been tried on a charge of to have been tried on a cnarge of carrying concealed weapons, is still at large this morning. Constable Wm. McGovern and Plainclothesman Fred Lefebre, both of the town police force, are in the hospital suffering from serious wounds as a result of a night-long chase in which score citizens took part, and which end ed this morning when the fugitive, armed to the teeth with automatics, took refuge among rocks in the country about two miles south of North Bay, along the shore of Lake Nipis-

Plainclothesman Lefebre may die He was shot through the lungs just as the chase was resumed with vigor at daybreak this morning. Constable McGovern, who was a former ember of the Royal Irish constabulary, was shot through the thigh from an ambush which Rogers laid for the police about 9:30 o'clock last night. when an automobile load of the town force answered a telephone call from
