BUYING OF PARIS BLOCK MUST BE APPROVED

Hon George P. Graham Replies to Question of Hon. Arthur Meighen.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Ottawa, May 29.—Right-Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition, drew the attention of the government to an announcement in the press yesterday saying that Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, had purchased a large block in Paris at a cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000. He wished to know if the government had any information to give the house on this matter.

Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, replied that the Canadian National Railway Board had been doing something toward obtaining suitable quarters in Paris. He had not any definite information at the moment, but he understood that if suitable quarters were obtained they would be used by branches of the government as well as by the railways.

Mr. Meighen said that if the report was true, the acquisition of this building would involve a capital investment which must be approved by the government. Had this approval been given?

"Not up to the present," replied Mr. Graham.

ADVISES ADDING ATHLETIC WORK TO CHURCH FIELD

Norman Gilbert of Bronte Addresses Hamilton Methodist Conference in Brantford.

TRANSFERS SLATED

Stationing Committee Submit Proposed Changes of District Ministers.

Brantford, May 29.—"The Church Program That Wins" was the subject presented to the Lay Delegates Association at the Hamilton Methodist Conference in session this afternoon, and was responded to by Norman Gilbert of Bronte, speaking for rural communities, Rev. H. B. Dellar of Port Dover for the town congregations, and Rev. Dr. Hughson of Hamilton for the city churches.

For a winning church program, Mr. Gilbert advocated the introduction of athletics into the church's field, asserting that new conditions surrounding modern churches demand attention to the physical development of the young people more than hitherto. Rev. Mr. Dellar, after praising the work of the church today, stated that mental, physical and spiritual elements were bound hand in hand to producing the right type of men and women so essential in church leadership.

Dr. Hughson outlined his conception of the successful church program as including four main factors—a strong and effective pulpit; music suitable to the service; spirit of service pervading the congregation, and instructive church announcements.

Principal Dobson of Alma Ladies' College, St. Thomas, also spoke briefly. This evening, W. E. Plewman of Hamilton gave an interesting talk on church missions, followed by an address on "Christian Stewardship," by Mrs. (Rev.) J. Smith of Dobblington.

The discussion on these addresses was led by three laymen, George Williamson, Brantford; T. A. Rutherford, Galt; and J. M. Dwyer of Milton.

Three jubilee addresses were given at the ministerial session by Rev. C. R. Morrow, Hamilton, Rev. A. E. Dellar of Brantford, and E. L. Clement. The first draft of the report of the stationing committee of the Hamilton Conference was handed to the press this afternoon.

Here are three hits to carry the fastidious miss through a summer's day. There is the hat for morning and rough wear, the shade hat for sport and general wear and the picture hat with fluffy trimming for party wear. Each is pretty and becoming and serviceable as well as a reflection of the accepted styles for summer.

For morning, motor or rainy day wear is the hat in the centre. It is silk or leather, as you please, and has a band across the back to fasten under the chin when the weather is windy. It comes in two tones and may be had to match one's top coat or suit or perhaps one's sports sweater. It is a very charming style in brown and gray and navy, tan and the two popular combinations.

At the right is a soft butter colored leghorn for sports or any informal occasion. It is swathed with a beautiful batik scarf which is tied in a small bow to finish off the back. The hat is faced here with crepe to match the batik band but it may be left unfaced for more general service. The hat is the popular drooping brimmed shape with a short back.

The hat for garden parties or more formal occasions is pictured at the left. It is a white straw with a round crown and wide soft brim. The trimming is something a bit out of the ordinary being many petal like medallions of embroidered organza forming a soft brim and a side trimming on the crown. Black grosgrain ribbon with plicated edges encircles the crown and is the only other bit of trimming in evidence. This ribbon may be replaced if one wishes with colors to match one's party frock, say orchid, yellow, green or rose.

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
