Braden thought the inspectors should all be London men, as meetings might often have to be called at short notice. Inspectors elected were Mr. McLellan, E. S. Little, R. J. Goldie of Saginaw, J. Kent Campbell, and S. S. Demoulin of the Firestone Tire Company.

J. S. Moore stated 464 votes were represented at the meeting. The total assets of the Ruggles Company as far as the Lendon and Western Trusts Company had ascertained were \$662.643.63 the liabilities being were \$603,643.63, the liabilities being




