True Bills Expected To Be Returned For Each.

RIDDELL PRESIDES

Grand Jury, After Address, Retires To Consider Evidence.

True bills are expected in all four criminal cases sent to the grand jury this afternoon by Mr. Justice Riddell, presiding at the fall assizes. Court convened at 1 o'clock, the

grand jury retiring to consider the Evidence in the cases of Thomas Clare and William Hodges, both

charged with manslaughter, is being brought before the grand jury by Crown Attorney Albert M. Judd and Crown Prosecutor V. A. Sinclair, K.C., of Tillsonburg.

Later in the afternoon, evidence in the Fox and Sansone cases will also be brought before the jurors. Thomas Fox is charged with rape and Sylva-dore Sansone with indecent assault. His lordship decided to dispense with the jury in the case of Fitz-simmons vs. Vining, a damage action over farm land being flooded with water, and is taking up this case while the grand jurors are consider while the grand jurors are considering the four criminal cases.

E. T. Essery, K.C., is appearing for Mr. Fitzsimmons and T. G. Meredith, K.C., for Mr. Vining.

Addresses Grand Jury.

"While this place was selected 130 years ago as capital of the province, grand juries have not been sitting here for that length of time. However, for over 100 years grand jurors have sat in this city at least four times a year," said his lordship in addressing the grand jury. "The duties are not as extensive as they once were, but they are enough to demand your best attention. Four persons are to be tried by a jury at this court, but before this can be done you must receive evidence on done you must receive evidence on the cases, although they are not tried

before you in open court.

His lordship then instructed the grand jurors as to the nature of their duties in detail.

Stating that there were two man-

slaughter cases to come before them, slaughter cases to come before them, his lordship stated that the word manslaughter was sometimes not properly used. There were scores of cases in which manslaughter might not be much worse than an acci-

dent.
"Manslaughter is killing without intent," stated his lordship. "If a perintent," stated his lordship. intent, stated his lordship. If a person is killed without excuse it is murder," said Mr. Justice Riddell. "But if he kills without intention or by carelessness, that is manslaughter. The law is that a man driving motor car must proceed slowly enough to be safe. Some places it may be safe to drive 20 miles an hour, and then again a speed of one n hour may be dangerous "Was the man driving too fast?

If you believe he was, you must bring in a true bill.

"Was he using reasonable care? If
he wasn't, that's manslaughter." No Difficulty.
