# MASKED ROBBERS.

OKLAHAMA, Oct. 27.—Sac and Fox, an Indian agency sixty miles southeast of Strengthens, here, was held up and looted by the es the same gang of bandits who looted the town of Carney last week. Sac and Fox is 36 miles from Carney. There were younges, 24 four masked robbers mounted and armed.
