DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN ACTOR

"Billie" Boehner Known Also As Prof. Lawrence, Has Passed Away.

BOSTON, March 17.—William Lawrence, who succeeded Denman Thompson as Uncle Josh in "The Old Homestead," and an actor of prominence, died late Tuesday night at the Deaconess Hospital, Brookline, after an illness of only four days.

The play had been at the Globe Theatre for several weeks, and last Friday night Mr Lawrence collapsed at the end of the second act and was forced to give up for that night. The next day he seemed to be very much recovered and decided to play the matinee. After the play was on a short time he again collapsed, and this time his condition was so much worse that he was taken to a hospital. After entering the hospital he declined rapidly. William Lawrence had played the role of Uncle Josh in "The Old Homestead" more than 3,000 times, and had more than satisfied the doubts of those who thought that the death of Denman Thompson, creator of the role, would end the success of the play.

His first appearance as Uncle Josh was in the Boston theatre, Oct. 19, 1905, when Mr. Thompson was ill, and several weeks thereafter he continued in the part. Previous to going with Mr. Thompson he had played rural parts in a travelling company. Up to the time of Mr. Thompson's death in 1910, Mr. Lawrence remained with the original company, sometimes taking the lead. According to Mr. Lawrence's reminiscences, there were frequently times when he would go on as Uncle Josh during the second and third acts, while Mr. Thompson took the part in the first and fourth.

For the past eleven years Mr. Lawrence had carried on the role as originated by Mr. Thompson. Among Mr. Lawrence's treasured possessions, aside from the boots, spectacles, steel trunk and other properties used by Mr. Thompson, was a gold watch given him by Mr. Thompson shortly after Mr. Lawrence made his debut in Boston in the role of Uncle Josh.

Mr. Lawrence was born in Nova Scotia, and at an early age was sent to sea with one of five sea captain uncles. Later in life he became a fur trapper in Canada, and thereafter joined a travelling theatre company. Rural parts were his forte, even before he carried on the Uncle Josh role, and it will be because he was a master in such parts that the theatregoing public will most sorely miss him.

"Billie" Boehner was a native of Annapolis Royal, and had played in all the leading towns throughout the Maritime Provinces and many parts of Canada, as well as all over the United States and Newfoundland. The remains were brought to Annapolis Royal for interment, the funeral taking place with full Masonic honors.

FOUND BODY IN THE WELL

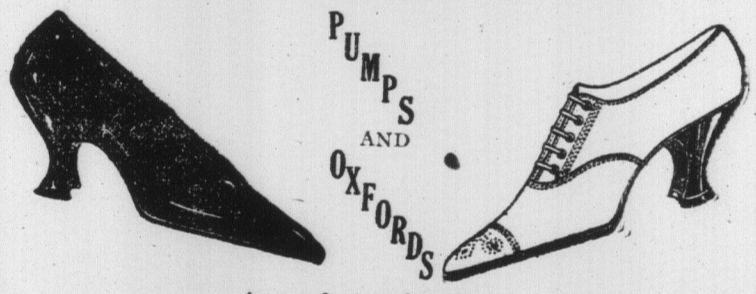

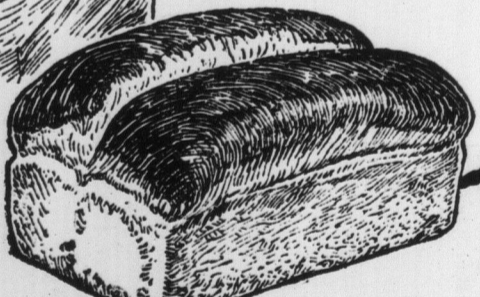

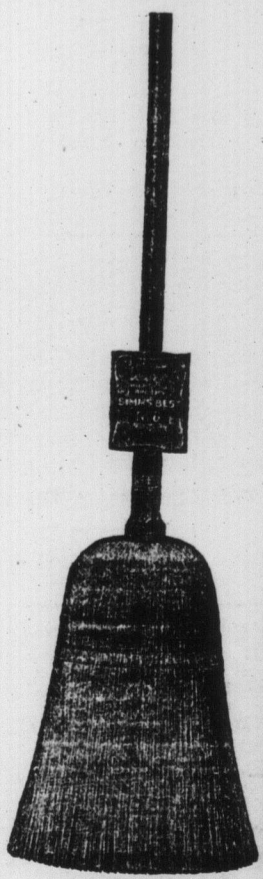
