#### IRISH NEWS.

Operations have been begun at the north pier of Arklow Harbor. These will be the means of giving some muchne ded employment.

THE. REV. James Devine, S. J., died on April 22 at St. Stanislaus' College, Tulia-more, at the age of thirty two years. Father Devine, who was endowed with rare intellectual gifts, was for some time a professor in St. Columb's College, Derry.

THE REV. Philip O'Doherty, curate of Moville, the popular and patriotic priest occupied the bare walls of the cabin, of Inishowen, has been, appointed a member of the Royal Irish Academy. Father O'Doherty is a Derry man by birth, is a distinguished Irish scholar, and is well known in the North for the pro-minent part he took in Nationalist politics during recent years.

HIGH HANDED SEIZURES BY AGENTS OF SMITH BARRY .- A sheriff's officer, accompanied by Mr. Butler, estate bailiff to Mr. Smith Barry, visited the land at Bohercrowe, where Philip O'Neil, one of the Smith-Barry evicted tenants, has been residing since his eviction, nearly three years ago, and seized ten heifers which they found on the land, in satisfaction of the rent which Mr. O'Neill, owed. The cattle were conveyed to the pound at Tipperary, and after they had been secured, Mr. Richard Hanrahan, butter n erchant, demanded their release on the grounds that they were his. The bailiffs refused to surrender them unless an affidavit was made by Mr. Hanrahan stating that the cattle were his. The latter declined to do this and notified the pound keeper that he would institute legal proceedings against those who were responsible for the detention of the animals. The bailiffs then went to Mrs. Giant, another evicted tenant, and took

a jennet and cart which they found in her yard for a similar claim. The ownership of the animal and cart was denied by Mrs. Grant, but they are still in cusby Mrs. Grant, but they are still in cus-tody. A seizure was also made at the residence of Mrs. Kerwick, William O'Brien Street, for the rent of a shop which her son, Mr. Thomas Kerwick, held from Mr. Smith-Barry in Main Street. Mrs. Kerwick repudiated any responsibility for the rent owed, but this denial would not be accepted by the heriff. Legal proceedings are threatened in this case also.

EVICTION OF EMERGENCYMEN AT WOOD-FORD.—Another has been added to the long list of exciting incidents in the struggle between Lord Clanricarde and his Woodford tenants. About three weeks ago, Mr. Timothy Clarke, P.L.G., was evicted from his holding. Mr. Tener, the agent, took possession of a hut which had been huift on the parochial plot for had been built on the parochial plot for the unfortunate tenant and his family, and placed half-a-dozen Emergencymen in charge in it. This was done in broad daylight within stone's throw of the police barracks, and in the presence of the police themselves, who have since carefully guarded the but and its occupants. Mr. Clarke, accompanied by a few friends, valked into the hut on April 18, and ordered the Emergencymen to clear out. The latter make a desperate rush for their firearms, but were prompty seized and ejected after a sharp struggle. Their beddings, furniture, arms, etc., were then deposited outside on the road, and the hut is now occupied by Mr. Clarke. An attempt was made on April 20 to recap-ture the hut, but the surprising party finding it strongly guarded, withdrew.

SAD DEATH OF A WOMAN AT DRUM-ANY .- An inquest was held recently at Drumany, parish of Leck, on the body of Mary Long, aged thirty six years, a widow. Deceased, Catherine Kennedy, her sister, and a child of three—now an orphan-were in absolute poverty, and the coroner advised the sister to take the child to Letterkenny Workhouse. This she refused to do. The wretched cabin in which the trio lived was entirely devoid of furniture or food, except a piece of stale and dirty bread. Catherine Kennedy said Mis. Long's husband, Henry James Long, had been killed in Scotland two years ago. "We have been supported chiefly on the charity of the public. We have no furniture whatever, and sleeping on the cay floor, without even straw to lie upon, and had only a fire of whin bushee when we gathered such. On April 19, Mrs. Long was in her usual way, complaining of the pains, but going about, and had taken food-bread and tea-twice. In the afternoon she went away, and was returning to the cabin Timothy Lawlor, of Ennistymon, a form-er Correlon prisoner. He was undergoing penal servitude for life in connection her sitting on the road. I assisted her into the house, and she lay down on the floor. MONTREAL'S REPRESENTATION. comments of a Contemporary Upon the Claims of Our Irish Catholics.

Although we completely ignore all political questions, and have resolved to treat every one alike, yet, we reserve to ourselves the right to insist upon fair play being shown to Irish Catholics in every si here, whether municipal or legislative. According to the new redistribution scheme our city is to have two more representatives in the Commons. Very well! It is proposed that one of these

is to be a French-Canadian and the other an English speaking Protestant. We would then stand two French-Canadians, two English-speaking Protestants and one Irish Roman Catho lic. On this point we will have a word to say before long. This Province has 44 French-Canadians, 18 English-speaking Protestants, and only 3 Irish-Catholics in the House. We are numerous enough to ask that the one we have for Montreal should be promoted to a sphere in which his talents, his energies, and his efforts in behalf of his constituents in particular and of all Canadian Irish-Catholics, in general, might be more potent in their beneficial effects. In this connection we deem it proper to call the attention of the "powers that be" to the commerical and political importance of this city, to the strength and influence of the Irish element here, and to the merits and claims of the present parliamentary representative of our people. We could not do so in a more appropriate manner than by quoting a couple of ex-tracts from a leading article in one of our Ontario contemporaries :--





A Petrified Priest.

While breaking new ground for a farm on the left bank of the Arkansas, half a mile from Booneville, Cel., the laborers exhumed the petrified body of a man clothed in the habit of a Catholic priest, says a correspondent of the Philadelphia Times. The dress and the figure might have passed for the cunning handiwork of some great master of sculpture. The two hands were clasped about an ivory crucifix, which hung from a rosary suspended about the neck, while the head of an arrow, still protruding from the breast, told the story of how the worthy father met his death; and the fact, so plain to be seen, that the body was bastily buried without a coffin, and the grave unmarked by the smallest token, showed that he and his brethren, or some faithful friend, were fleeing from the Indians when he was killed. The petrified body was removed to the Church of the Amunciation, where it was visited by crowds from all over the country. The face is that of a young man of refined and intellectual features, and the hands and feet are of elegant proportions.
