## CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS—RESTAURANTS AT RIVERS AND MELVILLE

Mr. SALES:

1. Are the railway restaurants at Rivers and Melville operated directly by the Canadian National Railways or indirectly by lease?
2. If by lease, to whom are they leased, for what period and for what amount?
3. Are they leased, furnished, free of taxes and with free light and fuel?
4. What control, if any, is there to insure the public of fair prices in connection with meals at these restaurants?

Hon. Mr. KENNEDY:

1. Operated under lease.
2. Leased to the Canada Railway News Company from year to year. The rent is included in general arrangement covering the operation of news service over entire system which is on a percentage basis.
3. The lessee supplies all equipment and furnishings and pays all taxes; the restaurants being located in the premises of the railway company, the latter supply light and fuel.
4. The railway company control prices through their local superintendents.

## CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS—MAIL CONTRACTS

Mr. SPENCER:

1. Do the Canadian National Railways have the contracts to carry the mails when they run parallel with the Canadian Pacific Railway?
2. If not, why?
