CONSTRUCTION OF SMALL BOAT FACILITIES

Question No. 765—**Mr. St. Pierre:**

1. In the period 1957-58 to 1966-67 inclusive, how many wharves, docks and similar small boat facilities, costing not less than \$5,000 or more than

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\$250,000, were constructed for fishing vessels and pleasure craft in the following areas: the Atlantic Provinces, Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia?

2. What was the total departmental cost of such works in each of the four areas?

3. To what extent did provincial governments or other bodies participate in the capital cost of such works in each of the four areas?

4. Are charges levied for (a) fishing vessels (b) pleasure craft in each area and what are current fees?

5. Is there an estimate available for the number of fishing vessels and pleasure craft in each of the four areas and, if so, what are the estimates?

Mr. Yves Forest (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): I am informed by the Departments of Public Works and Transport as follows:

4. Charges are levied for fishing vessels and pleasure craft in each area pursuant to Schedule of the Government Wharves Regulations made by Order in Council P.C. 1964-104 of 23rd January, 1964, as amended. The current fees, which are the same in all areas, are as follows:

(A) Fishing Vessels: (i) moored at any float at a harbour: (a) per day or portion thereof, per foot of length, 2¢; (b) per month, per foot of length, 40¢; (ii) moored elsewhere than at floats and not engaged in loading, unloading, or other commercial activity, per 24 hours or portion thereof: (a) on Sundays and statutory holidays per foot of length, 1¢; (b) on other days, per foot of length, 2¢; (iii) minimum side wharfage, 50¢. The Regulations provide for the exemption of payment of side wharfage in respect of any fishing vessel tying up to a wharf solely for loading supplies, including fish bait, or for unloading the vessel's catch of fish.

(B) Pleasure Craft: Pleasure craft are charged the same rates as fishing vessels, but no exemptions are granted.

WHEAT BOARD JURISDICTION OVER RYE, FLAX AND RAPESEED

Question No. 784—**Mr. Southam:**

Is the government giving consideration to having Rye, Flax and Rapeseed placed under the jurisdiction of the Wheat Board and, if so, when will this action be taken?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): The question of placing rye, flaxseed and rapeseed under the jurisdiction of the Canadian Wheat Board continues to receive consideration.
