CUSTOMS TARIFF

TABLING OF REMISSION ORDERS

Hon. Tom Hockin (Minister of State (Finance)): Mr. Speaker, pursuant to Standing Order 67(2), I have the honour today to table in the House three tariff remission orders each of which remits over \$20 million during a five-year period.

While the Government made a commitment to the Standing Committee on Public Accounts in respect of income tax remissions, I am tabling these tariff remission orders in the spirit of openness and transparency and because of the similarity between the two types of remissions.

PROPOSED FREE TRADE

Mr. Nelson A. Riis (Kamloops—Shuswap): Mr. Speaker, it is an honour to present a petition pursuant to Standing Order 106 from a number of constituents who point out that the Conservative Government does not have a mandate from the Canadian people to conclude a free trade agreement with the United States.

They believe that the trade agreement negotiated by the federal Government threatens the very fabric of Canadian political and economic sovereignty by removing the power of the Canadian Government to effectively control foreign ownership and to develop Canadian energy resources in the best interests of Canadians or to equalize the opportunities between the regions of the country.

They also point out that the proposed deal would deny Canada the policy freedom to determine its own economic future which thereby undermines our ability as a country to build a society distinct from that of the United States.

Since this denies Canadians the secure access to the U.S. market that was the key objective in these trade negotiations

from the outset, and since it also threatens the loss of hundreds of thousands of jobs, they are asking Parliament now to dissolve and allow the people of Canada the opportunity to accept or reject the proposed free trade agreement in a general election.

Mr. Jean-Robert Gauthier (Ottawa—Vanier): Madam Speaker, it is my honour and duty to present four petitions to the House.

Your petitioners humbly declare that the Mulroney Government has sold out Canada and received nothing in return, whereas Canadian industries are still not protected from U.S. trade laws, whereas the United States obtained everything it wanted in all key sectors, especially agriculture, energy, auto trade, financial services and investment, whereas thousands of Canadian jobs are threatened and the Conservative Government has not provided for any adjustment assistance for Canadian workers.

Wherefore your petitioners humbly pray and call upon Parliament to denounce the Government for signing the Mulroney-Reagan trade agreement.
