Dear Professor Sugars:-

Replying to your communication of April 11th, I approve of the description of what you call your two-year Extension Course in Accountancy, Law and Mathematics. I do not approve of this being called an "Extension" course, because I regard it as a regular course given by the University to students of the Accountancy Associations. For that reason, in your Commerce Announcement you should not call this course an "extension" course, neither should you call it an "evening" course, although the description will disclose that it is given in the evening. You are not to put the fee following the description. These fees will appear in the regular fees of the Accountancy course. I hope you see what I am driving at, that is, to strip this course of every appearance of an Extension course.

In the postscript of your letter you ask if you are to insert in the Announcement the other evening courses that will be given in connection with the Department of Commerce. The answer is "no". These courses will appear in the Extension Announcement.
