Picardy, amount to no less than 150,000 l. Sterl. per Annum; a strong Proof that this Manusacture is no new Acquisition to France. Mr. Fortry in the same Book, makes the Value of all the Goods imported from France into England amount to 2,600,000 l. per Annum\*. About the same Time the general Exports from France were computed at 6 Millions, 750 Thousand Pounds Sterl. per Annum, and upwards; and the general Ballance of Trade in her savour at 5 Millions Sterl. per Annum; so prodigious was the Consumption of French Commodities in Foreign Countries at that time.

WHAT is very remarkable, France was all this while without Merchants and without Shipping. The French were only Fac-
