ENDURING

2. *It must be a peace that is enduring.* I do not mean to imply that with the ending of this war we can make a peace that shall bind the world for all time to come. I am well aware that in many quarters the conviction is expressed that this is "a war on war" and that "this will be the last great war." I regret to say that I cannot cherish that hope. No doubt we shall see a great revulsion of world sentiment against war with a diminution of armaments and the war-spirit rebuked. But that is not necessarily the end of war. As Tennyson asks, "Who can fancy warless men?" But we mean this much at least, that in the peace that follows there must be no patching up, no compromise with honor, no temporizing, no mere cessation of hostilities for a season, no healing of the hurt of the daughter of my people slightly, saying, "Peace! peace! when there is no peace," no such obscuring of the great principles and issues at stake as to leave the whole battle to be fought over again.
