ENDURING

2. It must be a peace that is enduring. do not mean to imply that with the ending of this war we can make a peace that shall bine the world for all time to come. I am wel aware that in many quarters the conviction i expressed that this is "a war on war" and tha "this will be the last great war." I regret to say that I cannot cherish that hope. No doub we shall see a great revulsion of world senti ment against war with a diminution of arma ments and the war-spirit rebuked. But tha is not necessarily the end of war. As Tenny son asks, "Who can fancy warless men?" Bu we mean this much at least, that in the peac that follows there must be no patching up, n compromise with honor, no temporizing, n mere cessation of hostilities for a season, n healing of the hurt of the daughter of my peo ple slightly, saying, "Peace! peace! when ther is no peace," no such obscuring of the grea principles and issues at stake as to leave th whole battle to be fought over again.
