GUELPH HAS A NEW PLAN

Will Fit Up Disused Factory Building to Nurse Along Industries That Promise Well.

GUELPH, Nov. 25.-(Special.)-Sick and tired with the unsuccessful experiences with big bonus hunting industries, that speak of locating here, but fail to do so unless bonussed to an unreasonable degree, the City of Guelph is taking a new course. A nursery for incustries, a sort of incubator for the hatching of factories, is to be established, where promising manufacturers can start in a way, and be assisted in their efforts to stand and establish big factories that will ultimately mean the employ-

ment of many hands and the building up of the city industrially.

The idea originated with Chairman Sam Carter of the Light and heat commission, who stated to the Board of the Commission of the Light and heat commission. Trade at a special meeting to-day that the commission were contemplating having an old burned-out furniture factory, that belongs to the commission, reofed over and put into first-class condition. They will rent flats, or manufacturing apartments, to promising the small manufacturing con cerns, giving them room and power at actual cost. They will only make sure that the people they help are realiy ambitious to establish larger industries when they can The commission might spend about \$6000 fitting up the build-

ing and putting in motors for the ten-The main scheme for which the special meeting of the board was called. lowever, was the establishment of a co-operative furniture factory in a vacant building which the city has had on its hands as the result of a failure of the Morlock Co. The scheme met with approval. The co-operative company is to be organized and the ne essary \$10,000 capital raised by stock subscription right away. The city is giving them the building and machinn it almost free of rent, or at

least at a nominal figure.
