Geo. Cumming, professional to the Toronto Golf Club, holds a unique position in regard to Canadian golf. While still a young man he is the oldest pro in Canada, baying been with the Toronto Golf Club since March, 1909. During his twelve years' service there hav passed thru his bands no less than six Canadian boys who to-day are considered among the premier players of the country and are connected with prominent clubs in Ontario and Quebec as follows:

He won the open championships in 1905, has been runner up three times, and out of the prize list only once since its inception. In the W.S.G.A. open championships at Myopla in 1905 he had the best individual score, finishing seventh and followed up his good work by wining an open event at Brooklin the next day. Cumming is known from coast to coast in Canada by golfers, and has few superiors on the continent, as an instructor and player. He has what is considered a perfect style in golf, his iron play being very deadly. Acting Mayor Church Resents Criticism of Mayor Geary and Treasurer Coady and Waxes Warm.

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"The policy of the press in attacking Mayor Geary and City Treasurer Coady for the failure of the city's debentures in London, shows a cowardly attitude," said Acting Mayor Church vesterday. "Neither of them wanted to make the trip," he said, "and they went at a great sacrifice. I think these attacks have been inspired by the banks. We have always had an open door policy regarding our loans, and it is the first time in history that we have been unsuccessful. This was entirely due to the condition of the market and to no other reason. The acting mayor went on to say that the attitude of the local banks had been absolutely unfair. They could not give the city any reasonable rates for a loan, and yet they objected to the trip abroad to obtain the money.
