PROHIBIT COURT REVIEW OF OFFICIAL INSPECTION

Roosevelt Makes Suggestion to Committee on Meat Bill Before Congress.

Washington, June 16.—As a result of a conference today of members of the house committee on agriculture, at which Representative Adams presented the objections of President Roosevelt to the substitute meat inspection bill, a regular committee meeting will be held on Monday, at which the suggestions of the president will be considered formally.

The president's desire to prohibit a court review of the inspection is regarded as perhaps the question which will be most difficult of agreement. There is little opposition to striking out the court review provision from the substitute, but the president wishes to go a step further according to the representation of Adams in saying the discretion of the secretary of agriculture to make the final decision regarding the matters of inspection and the healthfulness of the product. The lawyers on the committee pointed out today that to strike out the court review and insert these discretionary clauses, would take away the right of appeal to the courts except on the constitutional ground of confiscation of property. The courts have held, it is said, that where the law leaves a matter to the discretion of the head of an executive department, the courts cannot review the exercise of that discretion except in case of confiscation.

The president wishes the labels on the packages of meat foods to bear the date of manufacture, and the decision of this suggestion is said to have developed some opposition also.

Another of the suggestions for change is that a time limit be fixed for which the packers must dispose of their stock on hand, when the inspection provision goes into effect. The substitute is silent on this point, but such a provision is believed to have increased from time to time and in this way products put on the market without inspection.

Garden Party for Murder Jury.

Utica, June 17.—After Mrs. Presser had given testimony yesterday at the trial of her husband for murder, Justice Rogers adjourned court until Monday morning. He gave the jury permission to take a trolley ride yesterday, to attend church in a body, or in two groups to-day, and to assemble at the house of one of the members and have a garden party among themselves this afternoon.

\$1 Gives \$100,000 to Harvard.

Boston, June 16.—The class of 1881, Harvard College, whose 131 living members include a large number of men distinguished in public and professional life, will this year celebrate the 25th anniversary of its graduation by the gift of \$100,000 to Harvard University. The income may be applied to the needs of the college as necessity requires.

THREE VISITORS ARRESTED

Accused of Shoplifting From Robt. Juner's Establishment—Grocers' Guild Cases.

Hamilton, June 17.—(Special.)—The charge against the Grocers' Guild will be continued at the police court on Monday morning. Crown Attorney Washington expects to finish the case. It will take about three days to take the evidence. Among the witnesses will be the agent of the Force Food Company and R. L. Innes of the Canadian Packers.

HAIL RUINS CROPS.

Terrific Thunder and Rain Storm Passes Over Syracuse.

Syracuse, June 16.—A terrible thunder-storm, which amounted almost to a cloudburst, passed over this section late this afternoon. West of the city there was heavy hail, which is reported to have done considerable damage to crops. Local trolley traffic was desolated for two hours because of dirt washed on to the tracks and the downtown cellars were flooded. Lightning struck half a dozen places in the city, but no serious damage was done.

D. A. Stevens of Savannah, Ga., was killed by lightning in a barn during the storm and a boy killed him, the one escaping injury.

"REVENUE" AND DEGENERACY

ONE A SIGN OF THE OTHER

Rev. Dr. Smith's Sermon on Methodism—Conference Ordination.

Ordination services in connection with the Methodist conference took place yesterday when Thomas Green, B. A., B. D., and Wm. Sibley were ordained to the ministry, and R. E. Morton, John Sutherland, James H. Bury, R. Gray, E. D. and Norman Wray were ordained for special church work.

A pleasant reunion of the ordination class, of which President Burns is a member, took place in the form of a luncheon on Saturday at McConkey's, with Dr. Burns as host. The class is known as that of '78. The ordination took place on June 15 of that year in the Town of Port Hope. The late Rev. J. Shaw was the president. It was a class of only five members, of whom are present at this conference, viz. Rev. Dr. Burns, C. W. Watch, J. W. Stewart, P. W. Brown and W. H. Maden. The members serving the church in the west, Rev. Prof. Stewart of Manitoba College, and P. W. Davies; two are in the London conference, Rev. A. Brown and G. Edmunds; one in Montreal, Rev. G. Reynolds; one in the Bay of Quinte, Rev. G. Brown; Rev. T. Campbell became a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church; Rev. J. H. Barkwell is resident in the United States, and Rev. G. W. Hewitt was unable to be present. Three members of the class have attained the presidential chair, and six have been honored as chairmen of districts. The reunion was a most interesting one, and Rev. C. W. Watch in an address congratulated both the class and its president on his elevation to the chair.

The doctors got hold of the subject on his elevation to the chair. Rev. Dr. Smith in a vigorous address based upon I. Peter, II, 9, exhorted the purpose and aims of the early Methodist Church, and incidentally condemned the modern methods by which traveling evangelists are introduced to promote the work of revival.

The life of John Wesley constituted an epoch in English history. The ground between Roman Catholicism and the English church. The founder of the Methodist church was no simple evangelist, but God's thunderbolt which he stood, the universality of the atonement, was now recognized as a fundamental truth by every evangelizing church.

The Methodist church stood not on its record as to scholastic attainments, but as an evangelizing power, and the need of the church to-day was not higher criticism and subtle attempts to belittle God's holy word, but a desire of men to a knowledge of the truth.

Continuing the doctor said: "Have we fallen upon degenerate times when we bring a professional revivalist who is here to-day and away to-morrow with a hymn book of his own, to the exclusion of our own hymns?" During the past two decades we have been organizing machinery to the exclusion of the spirit!

CIGARET BUTT AIDS FORGER.

Used to Partially Destroy Number on Cheque.

Buffalo, June 17.—When Ralph B. Mack said good-bye to his mother yesterday as he left home for the ball game, he was locked up in a snare which he told her he would be back to supper, but the next morning she saw him being taken to the Seneca-street Police Station on the charge of forgery, preferred by Miss Margaret Hillier, whose brother owns a saloon near the Royal Hotel.

Mack received a pay cheque for \$125. At Hillier's saloon many of the hands get their cheques cashed.

In theory, Mack according to the story he told the police, had great faith in the next part of the cheque, the number of the cheque and partly destroyed that and the corner of the paper. Then he took pen and ink and made the figure one into a six by hooking the figure on the T and hooking, then coming down with a flourish for the body of the capital E. This gave him a pretty respectable-looking E. Mack next dotted the first part of the W, which gave him the letter I, then he crossed the next part of the W and him the letter X. He wrote of snugged out the first E in twelve crossed the L, making it a T, and put a tail on the last letter, which gave him sixty. The rest of the cheque stood as written by the Erie paymaster.

Mack's next step was to turn his initial R into a B, and adding L-ter to his name, made it read B. Mackler. Instead of R. B. Mackler, he got rattled when he endorsed, however, and left the R off.

RUSSIAN GIANT DETAINED.

His Biggest Man in World, But Can't Pass at Ellis Island.

New York, June 17.—The Russian giant, Machnow, who is 9 feet 2 inches tall in his stockings, is at Ellis Island and the prospects are that he will not be admitted to the United States unconditionally.

Machnow, with his wife and the agent of Oscar Hammerstein, arrived here yesterday on the steamship Pretoria, and the giant was traveling as a tourist. Whether he was held up because the immigration authorities had received a letter saying that he should not be allowed to land, or whether it was because of his examination after several hours' examination came to the conclusion that the giant was suffering from kidney disease. A special board of enquiry will be called to act on the case. The anonymous letter said that the giant was weak minded, but it would not say so.

In the meantime the representative of Mr. Hammerstein did not appear to be worried. Ever since the giant he held up, the theatrical manager can give a bond that he will not become a public charge and Machnow can come in.
