SCARCITY OF LABORERS HITS CANNING INDUSTRY

Factories Unable to Secure Sufficient Help in Rush Season to Gather Crops.

With labor scarce in almost every line of trade, the outlook for a supply of operatives for the canning in-

dustry is not bright. This was the opinion of several gentlemen engaged in the wholesale grocery trade expressed to The World

It was suggested that perhaps if the wages offered were sufficiently remunerative there might be an exodus from Toronto and other large cities to the towns where canning factories are located, but the view was expressed that, while the change to the country might be an inducement in hot weather, owing to the nature of the work inexperienced pickers could not hope to make enough by piecework to recoup them for the change of voca-

The canning industry has been com-

pelled to seek locations outside the cities, and yet within easy reach of railroad facilities. In the small towns they can get and hold a force of employes sufficient for their regular requirements, but an extra heavy staff is necessary for the short season. In these smaller towns there is but a very small floating supply of labor that can be utilized for a brief period and the nturned adrift. And much difficulty is experienced in securing hands to pick small fruits, peas, to-matoes, etc. This has been the case for the past few years, but seems to be greater than usual this year.
