**TO-DAY'S ECLIPSE.**

The Moon Will Very Largely Obscure the Light of the Sun This Morning.

Get out your smoked glass, for to-day the sun shall be darkened.

Between the hours of 8.46 and 10.56 this morning the sun will be partially obscured by the intervention of the moon.

The maximum of eclipse will be reached at 9.40, when about one-third of Old Sol will be hidden from the view of Torontonians.

Along a belt of about 25 miles breadth, extending from a point in the Pacific Ocean west of Mexico, passing through the centre of Mexico, touching the northern shore of Cuba, passing north of Hayti, through the midst of the Windward Islands, and ending in the middle of the South Atlantic Ocean, the eclipse will be annular, the northern half of the moon so concentrated of the day as to obscure all but a thin ring of the dazzling golden sun.

The too close proximity of earth's satellite to its centre of gravity will prevent the total eclipse of the latter part of the day, which will be visible throughout that part of Canada, the United States, Mexico, West Indies, Central and South America, and the western part of the intervening ocean.

At 10.56 a total eclipse visible in the Caroline Islands, when a party will go the astronomical and physical sciences.

For as wholesome a diet as possible with canned goods.

"I took three months to travel from Juneau to Forty-Mile, a distance of about nine hundred miles, I think. We traveled ten or twelve, and occasionally fifteen miles a day. We couldn't do more because the dogs wouldn't stand it. Up to the summit we carried our own stores, and on the other side hired Indians. We had fresh meat on the way—moose and caribou.

At first when I saw the dirty natives bringing it in their canoes I could not bring myself to eat it, but I soon changed my mind and got used to it. We prepared our meals by setting up our stove right on the ice, in the open sometimes, and at other times pitched a tent and did our cooking under cover, then up stakes and on again. At night we pitched our tents, made beds of boughs, put blankets on, and rolled ourselves in blankets, covered ourselves with the fur robes and slept well. We had our pairs of heavy blankets, and I took two small pillows along.

"Our bedding was always packed in the wauks, and so kept dry all the way. The best time made was across La Barge Lake. We crossed the 36th parallel at night. They put the tent upon the provisions, the boys went and went to bed in it and slept all the way down to Lewis River. We had to make such good time because we were afraid the ice would begin to run and the boats go under.

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**MORE POLICE TO BE SENT.**

Controller White Will Despatch Eighty More Men to the Yukon—Advice as to Collection of Royalties.

Ottawa, July 28.—An order was issued to-day by Controller White of the Mounted Police for the despatch of eighty additional police to the Yukon district. Twenty-five will start at once, and the balance in detachments as soon as they can be properly equipped. Care is being taken to select the best possible men, not merely those who are of good health and high physical vigor, but sturdy men, who are familiar with boats, and who are of good character, and who are able to turn their hands to anything useful.

Regarding the collection of royalties on the gold dust, the advice of the Government officials in the district is being sought. It is thought that a general collection of this kind will be difficult, but he expects to arrive at a satisfactory system.

The Yukon question seems to be the all-absorbing one with the Cabinet at present. Sir Henry Joly and Hon. Messrs. Scott, Bristow and Sifton have devoted their attention to the matter for some days, and other Ministers have been constantly summoned by wire. Some important regulations have been announced as a result. One is a very radical one, and it is expected to serve as Government property every alternate claim in all placer grounds. Every month of the month of the territory the work on an adjoining location will be reserved for the Government. The Government will be allowed to take up any claim on the output of the placer diggings. Under the new mining regulations, established last May, upon receiving a month of the month of the Yukon, this royalty of forty per cent. will be paid to the holder. The weather was dreadful and the trip very hard, but he kept his feet and returned with a good deal of gold. **Baths Under Difficulties.**

"The cabins didn't have all the improvements by any means. We had no hot or cold water. When we wanted a bath we melted ice, heated it, and then used it. We used to wash in the gold and did our bathing in that. I was not sick once during the time I was there, except slight indigestion, and I'm 25 pounds heavier now than when I went up, and feel better than ever.

"I went out nearly every day when I had finished my housework. I would hunt the dumps for nuggets, or else pan for gold. I'd have to melt the water for flat, and at first I lost half the gold. But after a time I learned to do it better. Things were very high up to get it all with me. At one time we paid \$60 for a 20-pound sack of flour, and 25 cents a pound extra for postage, and were obliged to get it. I paid \$6 a yard for dress goods and \$300 for having a skirt made. There, they saw for the natives—make the steamer and blue satin dresses for them, all in the same style, and the blouse, buttoned straight down the front, and a skirt, and a pair of shoes.

"Eight months of the year it is dark up there, with only about four hours light each day. There is a gray twilight and the men work through it. They often had to light the lamps at half-past eight, but in the afternoon. We had oil lamps, but the majority of the men used kerosene lamps.

"In the winter the Yukon is one of the healthiest places for any one going there with sound health. It is a great deal better than any other place in the world. The water is bad, it gets very hot, and the mosquitoes are awful.
