"HAMILTON FOR HAMILTONIANS." Such is the motto of The Hamilton Spectator. The World has been reading what that paper says about Hogtown (Toronto), and about the people of Toronto trying to coax business to this place. The same paper is calling a Toronto baggage transfer company names because it proposes to start a branch in that city. What about the Hamilton newspaper that owns a job office in Toronto? It is The Spectator people who own it and we are glad to say they are doing a good business. And if the Verral Company is to be boycotted in Hamilton what about Mr. William Hendrie of Hamilton, who does a little teaming on the side here and thereabouts?

What Hamilton is doing with its trolley lines to Dundas, to the Beach, to Grimsby, to Ancaster, viz., drawing business from these smaller places to itself, so is Toronto doing to Hamilton and other towns. Suppose that Mount Hope, Ryekman's Corners, Hall's Corners, Bullock's Corners, Slabtown, Clappison's Corners, Waterdown, Binkley's Hollow, Gage's Corners, Fiddler's Green, Greensville and Crookes' Hollow, should all rise up and say "Mount Hope for Mount Hoppers, Hall's Corners for Hall's Cornerites, and Crookes' Hollow for Crookes' Hollowers," where would Hamilton be then? It is all very well to cry "Hamilton for the Hamiltonians" and to "Blazes with Hogtown," but the law of the case is the reverse of the verse.

The big city drains the smaller towns and the towns drain the villages. But somebody does the business all the same. Now who does it best? That's the man that'll get it.

WHY TORONTO GROWS.

The receipts of the Street Railway Company for the past month were \$12,000 in excess of those of the same month last year, and this in spite of the fact that the bicycle is much more popular this year than heretofore. The increase is equivalent to an average of \$400 a day, or about 15 per cent of the previous year's receipts. These statistics are representative not only of the increased business of the Street Railway Company, but of the strides that the city is making in every direction. The population is increasing daily, and building operations are in progress in all parts of the city. Toronto's manufacturing are all running full time and business generally is on the boom. This development, however, seems to have excited the jealousy of some of the provincial cities and towns, which attribute our growth to the trickery of the Council and of Commissioner Fleming in bribing manufacturers to remove from outside places to Toronto. The outside cities have no justification whatever for their hostility to Toronto. In the first place we have resorted to no trickery to bring factories here, and in the second place such inducements as we have offered have had little or no influence on the manufacturers, who have decided to locate in Toronto in preference to a provincial town. It would take more space than we can afford to enumerate all the advantages that Toronto possesses over the other cities and towns of the province. The first great fact about Toronto is its geographical position, which has made it the railway and steamboat centre of the province. This advantage is responsible for not a little of the headway that Toronto has made. Toronto is the objective point of the whole railway system of the province. The train service of the province originates in this city. Every morning and evening trains leave Toronto in all directions giving us direct communication with every part of the province. The railway facilities enjoyed by the city also make it the leading postal and express centre of the province. We understand that an organization in a western city has decided to remove to Toronto, principally because of the latter's postal advantages. There are very few cities west of Hamilton that can despatch an answer to Montreal on the same day as that on which a letter is received from that city. Toronto merchants can use the express facilities that are available to them and reach every part of the province before 3 o'clock in the afternoon and the greater part of it before noon. This is possible with no city east or west of Toronto. As the centre of the steamboat business of the province, Toronto enjoys another decided advantage over every other city. Toronto's geographical position has nothing whatever to do with assessments or exemptions, and yet it is the controlling factor of Toronto's supremacy as the commercial and manufacturing centre of the province. The bonus and exemption game has been worked much more to the disadvantage than the advantage of Toronto. This city will welcome legislation making it illegal to offer an inducement of any kind to influence a manufacturer to locate in one town as against another. Such legislation cannot be made too strict for Toronto, and it cannot be adopted too soon.

THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather, the outlook for business was never brighter. The importations for the Christmas trade are now in stock, and the wholesalers are in receipt of orders far in advance of any previous season, and heavy shipments are being daily forwarded to the Northwest and

Northern Ontario. The prohibition sentiment has not materially affected the consumption of liquor and wines, and the importation this season will show an increase of over 25 per cent. In groceries, dry goods and hardware a firmer tone is noticed with the volume of business largely increased. Harness and saddlery hardware dealers are invoking the aid of the Government to prohibit the importation of prison labor goods, and urge an increase in duties to shut out the refuse goods of American manufacture, now flooding the market. Retailers are looking for a seasonable change in the weather in order to increase the volume of sales, especially in furs and winter clothing. All indications point to the largest and best Christmas trade that Toronto has ever known.

THE U. S. AS A DISTURBING ELEMENT.

Lord Salisbury fears that the United States policy of expansion is a grave and serious event, and not conducive to the interests of peace. The aggressive attitude of the American peace commissioners is undoubtedly a disturbing factor in the present European equilibrium. The powers of Europe have good cause for viewing the conduct of the United States with suspicion and hostility. What the States set out to do when it declared war against Spain was to free Cuba from Spanish rule. Its crusade against Spain was undertaken in the cause of humanity. The war is now being settled on anything but a humanitarian basis. The liberation of Cuba from Spanish control is but a small part of the American program for winding up the war. Our neighbors are exhibiting a capacity for colonial possessions, which does not at all harmonize with their ante-bellum professions of humanity and justice. The European powers are more than justified in regarding the conduct of the Americans with distrust and suspicion. We will not be surprised to learn that American aggressiveness is responsible for not a little of the jealousy which seems destined to eventuate in war before long.
