The matter came up in the report of the Management Committee, which recommended the abolition of fees in the first grade of the Collegiate Institutes. Trestee Fraser, in moving the adoption of the clause, explained that the chief object of the movement was to popularize the High schools by bringing them within the reach of the working classes. The principals of the High schools, the inspectors and the newspapers heartily approved of this move-

Wanted to Abolish the Grade. Trustee Wilson admitted that there would be a larger attendance in the High schools if the project were adopted, but this would increase the cost of main-tenance, and the cry of the ratepayers was that the Collegiate Institutes were al ready costing too much. He moved an amendment that the first grade of the Collegiate Institutes be abolished altoget
