THE UNITED STATES AND RECIPROCIITY—OF TARIFFS. The late President's speech at the Pan-American Conference has been a true reflection of the policy of the United States, embodying as it did the virtues, hopes and aspirations of the people. According to Mr. McKinley the United States desired to live on friendly terms with all other nations, and in matters of trade he realized that the U.S. could not impose in the fancied security that it could forever sell everything and buy little or nothing. "The period of exclusiveness," said he, "is past. The expansion of our trade and commerce is the pressing problem. Commercial wars are unprofitable. A policy of good-will and friendly trade relations will prevent reprisals. Reciprocity treaties are in harmony with the spirit of the times; measures of retaliation are not."

President McKinley is dead, but the policy laid down by him in his Pan-American speech is still the policy of the United States. President Roosevelt has pledged himself to carry out to the best of his ability the policy of his predecessor, so that reciprocity, instead of retaliation, is to be the battle cry of the new administration. But was McKinley honest, and are the people of the U.S. honest, in their declarations in favor of reciprocity? Do as their words. If our neighbors honestly so let them prove it. Let them be good as their words. If our neighbors honestly believe in reciprocity they will soon begin to put the idea into practice. The United States tariff, as it affects Canada, has certainly not been fashioned on the now idea of reciprocity as laid down by McKinley and adopted by President Roosevelt. The U.S. tariff is one eminently designed to bring on a war of retaliation between the nations affected by it. Some of these nations, such as Russia and Germany, have already started in on a policy of retaliation. Canada will sooner or later be obliged to follow the example set by these nations. A question that is of much interest to Canadians at this moment is whether or not the United States is going to live up to its new policy and remove the obnoxious and unfair features of its tariff. The U.S. admits that it has been pursuing a wrong policy, and that it has reached a point in its development when it will have to be changed. Does anyone believe that the United States is going to alter its tariff policy as far as this country is concerned? The tariff is not the U.S. tariff as it is about twice as high as the Canadian. The application of the new policy would necessitate a reduction of about 60 per cent. in the U.S. tariff. No one in Canada is foolish enough to believe our neighbors will make any such reduction. We will be very much surprised if they make any reduction at all. How, then, is the new policy of reciprocity to be carried into effect as far as Canada is concerned? The U.S. has announced its policy, and has left it to Canada to carry it into execution. Both nations are agreed that there should be reciprocity and not retaliation. Let Canada raise her tariff to the U.S. standard and then we will have a reciprocity that Mr. McKinley favored as the policy of his country. Despite the sugar-coated words of Mr. McKinley we will never secure reciprocity from the United States of their own volition. Canada must never secure reciprocity from the United States of their own volition. Canada must take the initiative. We must raise our tariff up. Our neighbors will not take them down to our level. It might be possible to arrange a reciprocity treaty in regard to certain articles if the two tariffs were on the same level. But Canadians may be certain assured that this country will receive no concession from the United States as long as we are content to give that country all it asks without demanding anything in return.

Another narrow escape. The World has been reading the leading U.S. papers and the expression of opinion of prominent American statesmen, as contained in the assessment of the President's speech, to say, the city either comes into possession of a valuable franchise or it gets the proposed crown line constructed and equipped by the Toronto Railway. But in order to obtain these advantages, the Commission must move and issue orders, and not accept orders from the Toronto Railway. The city is the master, the company the servant.
