The Hague, Aug. 24.—An article supposed to be dictated by former President Kruger and Dr. Leyds, appears in The Courant of Rotterdam. It says that the stories of good-will between Boers and Britons are largely false, and adds:

"Tho for the time being we are humiliated and gnash our teeth in impotent rage, the best plan is to become good friends with the British. By these means the Boers will be enabled to reobtain before very long something very considerable to say in their own house."
