Call From St. Thomas to Rev. Wm. Reid, of Teeswater. Sustained.

The presbytery met in the Presbyterian Church, Port Stanley, yesterday (11th inst.). In the absence of the moderator, Mr. Lindsay, Mr. Wilson, ex-moderator, was appointed to preside. The minutes were approved. A committee was appointed to present a resolution of sympathy to the widow of the late Rev. J. M. Munroe.

It was also resolved that official notification of Mr. Munroe's death be sent to the convener of the widows' and orphans' fund, and that application be made for benefits of that fund on behalf of the widow and children. Mr. Henderson reported on behalf of committee appointed to draw up a resolution of sympathy with Dr. G.

Sutherland on his illness. It was adopted, and the presbytery heard with gladness that the latest reports were to the effect that Dr. Sutherland's health was improving.
Reports of commissioners to the general assembly were heard from Messrs. S. Smith, J. Milloy, Kelso, R. Stewart, W. J. Clark, A. Henderson, John Currie, Dr. A. Johnson and Mr. Lethbridge.

Lethbridge. The treasurer was authorized to pay the amount, when presented, for the printing of the pamphlet on "System-

atic Beneficersce." Rev. D. C. Johnson was appointed clerk to assist Dr. Sutherland, and pure, and give new vigor and elasticity a committee was appointed to consider the question of the clerk's salary, to draw up a resolution re the services of Mr. Courtenay as clerk pro tem.; and to apportion the salary due Mr. Courtenay for his services.

A memorial was presented from Mr. A. B. McGregor, of Appin, against the procedure of the session. Mr. Mc-Gregor was heard in support of the

The members of the session of Appin asked that Messrs. Ross and Stewart, of Melbourne, Wylie, ministers; and Messrs. Rathburn, Kittridge and Fletcher, elders, be appointed by the presbytery to act as assessors in dealing with the case of Mr. McGregor. This was granted. This was granted.

Dr. Smith presented the cause of French evangelization very ably to the presbytery.

It was resolved that augmentation scheme be taken up at the September meeting, and that Mr. Currie prepare for it. Also the widows' and orphans' fund, to be presented by Mr. A.Thompson, of Knox Church, South London. Mr. Fraser, late of Mosa, was granted his presbyterial certificate.
